ANZAC DAY Monday 25 April 2016

ANZAC Day is a remarkable opportunity to honour and remember the men and women who served this country for the freedom we enjoy today. It's also a time to reflect on the impact of war, conflict and peacekeeping operations in Australia's history.

For safety and public awareness, the organisers have provided the following March Protocol and check list:

- The Order of March starts earlier this year at 8.35am with Vietnam Veterans leading the march.
- 9.45am Step-off time for HMAS KANIMBLA, MANOORA, WESTRALIA, ASSAULT and DEMS. Please be at assembly point (see page 2) in Flinders Street by 9.00am. (Depending on how quickly the Vietnam Vets move, we may be asked to step off earlier—so don't be late!)
- All WWII veterans participating in march will ride in vehicles provided for them. Ring Chris Harvey before 27/3/2016 to book this service (see page 8).
- Veterans can request a RACV vehicle to pick them up from home preceding the march. Ring Chris Harvey before 14/3/2016 to arrange this service (page 8).
- Veterans to fill out Medical Identification Card (page 8) and carry in their pocket.
- Veterans wear medals on their left hand side
- Descendants wear medals on right hand side.
- Descendants should be old enough to march the full distance (1.8 Km) without assistance.
- Descendants are not to join or leave the march other than at the Assembly or Disposal points.
- Marchers should form up 6 abreast, unless otherwise advised by a March Official.
- When approaching the Eternal Flame; hats off, right hand over your heart, and 'eyes right' until your unit passes the Eternal Flame.
- Attire should be neat and tidy out of respect to the fallen (torn denim, sporting attire, dirty joggers etc are not appreciated).
- Carrying pictures & pushing prams will not be permitted.





Many Ex-service men and women assembled on 26 November 2015 at the funeral of Doug Pain as their last tribute to a shipmate, Stoker Douglas Payne, service number W2485.

Doug joined the Royal Australian Navy in 1942, at a time when Australia was actively engaged in World War Two. Although Doug was employed in a protected industry, he eventually managed to join the Army, and then transferred to the Navy. He joined up at Williamstown, commencing his Navy service at HMAS LONSDALE II. Then off to Flinders Naval Depot, better known today as HMAS CERBERUS. On completion of Doug's initial recruit training, he was selected for specialist training in support of the amphibious operations at HMAS ASSAULT, Nelson Bay. ASSAULT was the Establishment where some 2,00 Australian and 20,00 American troops were to become proficient at moving troops from ship to shore under war like activities, a very important role to say the least. Doug's next posting was to Madang, where he contributed to a range of activities. Madang was one of the largest holding areas for allied warships during the Second War.

Whilst at Madang, he posted to HMAS Westralia and then returned to Madang. Doug was awarded the Pacific Star, War Medal 1939-1945, Australian Service Medal 1935-1945 and Australian Service Medal 1945-1975. He was demobilised in May 1946 and returned to Rochester where he rejoined Victoria Railways and continued in their employ until his retirement.

Doug is survived by his wife Betty, father of Elizabeth, Andrea and John, father-in-law of Penny, Ted and Kylie, Grandfather of Michael Jnr, Andrew, Matthew, Liam and Eliza.

We know the time comes to each of us, when the Supreme Commander calls us from our earthly service but, however we may be prepared for this, we feel sorrow when there is another gap in our ranks.

Doug was one of a long line of sailors who served their Sovereign, and their country. Doug, and his shipmates, made a valuable contribution to the great traditions of the Navy. A Contribution that Doug continued to make, after his war service until just before his death. He was passionate about the HMAS Assault Association and the wellbeing of his shipmates.

There is no fear now, as he embarks on the unknown sea, for he is in the care of the Great pilot. We who remain wish him a safe voyage and firm anchorage, in that final harbour, where storms and tempest are no more.

Tribute to PO Aubrey Grant (Mick) Garrioch PM 1638 2.10.1917–25.10.2015

P.O. Aubrey Grant (Mick) Garrioch passed away after a short stay in hospital on October 25th, 2015. He had just had his 98th Birthday. Mick had a love of boats and the sea from the time he was a small boy. From Sea Scouts he joined the Reserves in 1936 at Lonsdale, reported for duty on 30th August 1939, and was assigned to DEMS.

His first ship was SS Hurumui. She was torpedoed and sunk south of Iceland on 14th October 1940. Mick was then assigned to SS Panama, leaving her when she got back to Australia.

Mick was at RAN Base Melville at the time of the bombing of Darwin, and on two occasions dived into the water to rescue men who had been concussed by the explosions. In 1943 he joined HMAS Shepparton, which was doing survey work north of Australia and in the Indian Ocean. Early in 1946 he joined HMAS Kanimbla and was there until mid 1947, when he was discharged as medically unfit.

Tribute to Captain Cecil Donald 27.3.1919—15.8.2015

A Mariner of the 20th Century

Donald was born in the country and had a love of the sea from a young boy. At the age of 17 he commenced his apprenticeship with the AUSN Co. In 1938 he joined HMAS CANBERRA for Naval training. The war years were spent on several ships: HMAS KANIMBLA, BALLARAT, AUSTRALIA, SYDNEY III, WARRAMUNGA & TOBRUK.

Post war years 1945-1958 with E & A.

In 1958 he joined the Torres Strait Pilot Service where he spent the next 30 years piloting ships through the reef. Retirement followed in 1988 and many years spent travelling by all modes of transport.

Donald spent his life doing what he loved the call of the sea always remained and his interest in all ships. **By daughter, Pip Gordon**

P incher was a diminutive King Charles Spaniel who lived a very comfortable high society life with his kind mistress. He even accompanied her on a winter holiday to Egypt in 1915 where she visited the camp of the Australian Expeditionary Force at Maadi. It was during this visit that, for reasons known only to Pincher, his affection transferred to Sergeant Thomas Borlase of the 7th NSW Light Horse Regiment. Pincher's mistress graciously gave him up to Thomas and they became inseparable. Two weeks later Sgt Borlase received orders to proceed to the Dardanelles.

On 15/5/1915 Pincher and his new master landed ashore at Gaba Tepe, Gallipoli. Outside his master's

immediate comrades there were few who knew of Pincher's presence in the trenches. He intuitively knew what was expected of him - he never barked. When danger was threatened his master would cover him with anything available and he knew not to move until he was released.

Someone who was aware of Pincher's presence was Major W...... who happened to hold Sgt Borlase in high esteem on account of his distinguished service during the Boer War. However not all the officers thought the same and consequently an order was sent to remove the dog from the front line and have him shot. When the search party approached Borlase for the dog he responded, "You needn't worry, the poor little wretch is in his grave". Unbeknown to them it was merely a temporary cover-up! However a few days later another officer spotted Pincher alive and well. For the second time the little spaniel was condemned to death. The Major sympathetically urged Borlase to use his ingenuity again to save his dog.

Before the warrant could be issued, military men and scores of friends whom Pincher had befriended by now sent a message down the line that a great lot of Australians would have to go before the dog went! Borlase had an idea and with the coast clear scuttled off with Pincher along the trenches—returning a while later with no dog. So when the NCO appeared with Pincher's death warrant, Borlase was able to take his colonel oath that the dog was gone.

Pincher was indeed his mascot - for two hours later a shell burst over the trench and Sgt Borlase was buried under the debris receiving serious injuries to the head, hip and hand. He was conveyed to the clearing hospital on the beach whereupon a mate brought him a bundle just prior to him boarding the hospital ship HS Neuralia and transported to Malta. At St Andrew's Hospital, Malta, the wounded Sgt Borlase clung to life while his little bundle enjoyed the well earned freedom of the wards. The nurses adored him and he was allowed to sleep at the foot of his master's bed. All pers botos destroye two pho for the two pho for edito 'The Bat 1915, '' The Ma

Sgt Borlase was admitted to the Australian Aux Hospital No1 (Harefield House, Middlesex) on 7/10/1915. Harefield House was a large manor and grounds donated by Ex-pat Australian Charles Billyard-Leake to the Australian Government to be used as a wartime hospital during WWI.

Two Adelaide nurses, Sisters Kathleen and Milli Uren were charged to attend Sgt Borlase. You can imagine their surprise when Pincher's hide 'n seek game got foiled when they lifted the coat belonging to patient Borlase from the floor to reveal

guess who? Pincher immediately extended his doggy paw shake and instantly won the nursing staff over. From that time onwards, while his master convalesced, Pincher assumed the office of "Rat-Catcher in Chief" to the Red Cross Hospital. At the appointed hour he'd punctually appear for meals and at regular intervals check in on his master's progress.

> On two occasions the hospital was visited by royalty; Queen Alexandra, also the King and Queen Mary. They listened with genuine interest in Sgt Borlase's story and kindly offered to care for his dog—but Borlase would not be separated from his loyal companion.

Sgt Borlase's fighting days were over. On 7/11/1915 he and Pincher departed aboard HMAT Runic for Australia. Borlase returned to the NSW bush and Conese Station with his precious bundle. Sadly, in mid 1917 the diminutive Pincher was taken down by a tick bite and passed away. His master died on 27 March 1920 as a consequence of his war injuries, aged 52. Thomas Harvey Borlase is Great Uncle to Marika Borlase (Artist) and to Chris Thomas Harvey, (President of AMC/LSI Assoc of Vic).

Sgt Thomas Borlase was a keen horseman, man of the land and a highly decorated soldier earning a DCM (Distinguished


Conduct Medal) for defence of Eland River Post during the Boer War in August 1900.

I spent two stinkin' years in the trenches of France, Getting bashed by the gas and guns. But my spirit shone through at Bullecourt and at Ypres, And at Villers Brettoneux we beat back the 'Hun'.

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Transport Request—ANZAC Day march participation

It is a request of the ANZAC Day Commemoration Council that all WW2 Veterans avail themselves of the transport facilities provided.

- Vehicles will be pre-located in Flinders, Swanston & Collins Streets. Veterans wishing to use transport will be directed by Marshals to waiting vehicles.
- Signs identifying Unit will be provided to drivers for display in the vehicle's window.

- Veterans with walking frames should endeavour to leave them with relatives or carer. If to accompany veteran in the vehicle, the walker must be of the folding variety.

Veterans who have difficulty in getting into, or out of military vehicles should use this RACV service. <u>They are welcome to</u> <u>leave their seats and go to the city end of the Shrine Forecourt to join their Association for the final stage of the march.</u>
