Mon 15th December 2014

1200 noon Shrine of Remembrance

This is our annual pilgrimage to the Shrine of Remembrance to honour and remember those who served on HMAS WESTRALIA for their dedication, sacrifice, amazing courage and discipline.

The Shrine Trustees will fly the flag of the White Ensign to honour HMAS WESTRALIA for its part in the landing operation conducted at Arawe, New Britain, 71 years ago on 15th December 1943 as a unit of the USA Seventh Fleet.

HMAS WESTRALIA's engagement in this operation marked the beginning of the 'Road to Tokyo'. Months of planning and training had taken place prior to the successful landing at Arawe. According to Executive Officer, W.N. Swan, it would require the ship's company to put in a "superhuman effort" to achieve their mission. And, that they did — showing discipline, focus, restraint and silent cohesive teamwork that functioned like a well oiled machine.

All Veterans, descendants and current serving members are welcome. We have a limited supply of car park passes for the Shrine – so please ring Chris Harvey on 0412 390 686 to secure your allocation.

We are requested to assemble in the Shrine Forecourt at 11.45am and if the weather is against us, then in the Visitor's Centre inside the Shrine. The Service will commence at 12.00 noon in the Sanctuary.

Later we move across to the nearby Observatory Cafe, Botanical Gardens, for a cuppa and gettogether. We are bringing along Alan Hooley's scrap book which shows the ship's Routine Order for that particular day 71 years ago. If you have photos or memorabilia you'd like to share, please bring them too. We'll have a Visitor's Book which we would like everyone to sign after the ceremony.

SHARING YOUR STORY

An article featuring the life of a Coxswain and the landing at ARAWE

I have taken most of the article about my father from his book, "The Sluggett/Sloggett War History (Mostly 1939 – 1945) by Max Sluggett JP (Ret.), copyright 1997.

Max (Dave) Sluggett was a coxswain on HMAS Westralia. The daily routine on board saw an 8am start with cleaning, polishing, painting or seamanship training class – learning gunnery, rules of the road, signals, etc.; there was a host of things to learn. Our ship's crew was split into three watches or groups so that at 8am one group went on watch the other two groups to normal ship's routine. The watches were known as the Forecastle, Midships and Quarterdeck. At about 11:30am the next watch for duty went to lunch so as to be ready to take over their "watch" at 12pm. At this time the other two watches would go to lunch. At 4pm again the changing of the watch known as the first "dog" watch, then 6pm known as the second "dog" watch. The "dog" watches are the means of changing the crew around so that they are not doing the same watch, day in, day out.


When it was drawing towards sundown it was "clear lower decks" and stand to until dark. There were conditions just before daylight when everyone had to 'stand to' at their battle stations. For it was at sunset and sunrise that the enemy were most likely to spring a surprise attack. At 8pm the first night watch took station and, for those off duty, it was 'lights out' at 9pm. 1130pm saw the calling of the midnight watch; they took over at midnight. The next watch was called at 330am to take over at 4am. Shortly after it would be 'clear lower decks' to close up for sunrise. When that closed down it was breakfast and normal ship routine. We were lucky have three watches as quite a number of ships only had two watches therefore they worked four hours on and 4 hours off. Although the boat crews were trained for a special job we still had to work ship's routine.

HMAS Westralia was involved in seven major landings during the war. They were Arawe, Hollandia, Panaon Island, Lingayen Gulf, Tarakan, Brunei Bay and Balikpapan. While we were trained, the Army and Air Force fought bravely against huge odds to hold the Japanese from invading our country.

The ship's first experience at combined operations was the landing at Arawe, next came Hollandia. One of the many incidents there was the Japanese had a gun on rails cut into the mountain about a third from the top with which they were making themselves a nuisance by firing at our fleet. A destroyer, patrolling at our rear, spotted where it was situated and she came racing through the fleet and, when the cannon made its next appearance, it was its last!

Dad reflects on his life at the war saying that as sad and destructive as war is he made some wonderful mates. He met chaps that he would otherwise never had met and known. "It was a friendship welded in adversity, a real education in Mateship".

Denise the Pig Who Went to War

Do any of our readers know the names of the three chaps on the left hand side of picture?

Denise the Pig was born on Panoan Island in the Philippines during WWII. She was a gift from the Filipinos who surrounded HMAS WESTRALIA in their canoes on the day the ship landed their Island. Denise joined the ship's company in the most undignified manner - enduring a number of sea dunkings whilst being transferred from canoe to ship. She presented a very poor figure of indeterminate sex as she landed, flaked out on the deck - exhausted. So pigs can swim – well this one could – just!

Although her unorthodox enlistment into the RAN was questionable, she adapted quickly to the task at hand. Her main duty was that of garbage disposal. True to form, she was a discriminating grunter, accepting the very best in food brought to her by numerous attendants from the cafeteria and served in specially constructed feed boxes with her very own name tastefully painted on them. In doing so she developed complete disregard for her figure. Her duty was never undervalued or under estimated - otherwise scraps might be thrown overboard which would leave a trail of evidence for the enemy.

Denise grew in brains and beauty. She stood thigh high to the skipper, could stand to attention during inspections and grunt before meals in the expectation of plenty. Her coolness under fire became a byword for the ship's company. Where she actually went on such occasions was a mystery, but when the four-inch opened up she was last reported moving through the QX mess-deck.

She was well cared for by the crew. Dr Jim Guest remembers her being walked around the deck on a lead. Each morning she was given a salt-water hosing – which one attributes to her peerless complexion. She ruled the ship's company from the after well-deck, where she was washed, oiled, fed and schooled in the art of being the only sea-going pig in the RAN.

She enjoyed the ships' company and was not averse to a little tipple – on one occasion displaying unfamiliar behaviour, staggering around in circles on the strength of half a bottle of beer. Her charm and personality won the hearts of all. Denise's most endearing quality was her ability to uplift the spirits of her shipmates by her absurd behaviour.
