# THE 2014 CRESWELL ORATION & HMAS YARRA VISIT

The coastal Minehunter, HMAS YARRA MHC87, is expected to visit Melbourne during late February of this year, in line with a "Unit Citation" presentation commemorating the loss of the sloop HMAS YARRA 2 during WW2 action against the Japanese in waters North of Australia. HMAS YARRA 2 was lost on March 4<sup>th</sup> 1942.

The visit to Melbourne by HMAS YARRA the fourth ship so named for the RAN, also coincides with the annual "Creswell Oration" timing.

The 2014 Creswell oration will be presented by the RAN'S Fleet Commander Rear Admiral Tim Barrett, AM, CSC, RAN. We are therefore pleased to advise that both the Commanding Officers and Executive Officer of HMAS YARRA IV, together with other crew members of the ship, will also join with us on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> February 2014 to celebrate the 113<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the foundation of Australia's navy at RADM Barrett's presentation of the "Creswell Oration".

# YOUNG ENDEAVOUR'S DECEMBER VISIT

A late RAN visitor to Melbourne for the year 2013, was the sail training Brigantine "Young Endeavour".

On a routine port visit YOUNG ENDEAVOUR arrived at Williamstown on 10<sup>th</sup> December. This was YOUNG ENDEAVOUR'S second Melbourne visit for 2013 having been here also with the "Tall Ships" in September. During the September visit the League took the opportunity of hosting YOUNG ENDEAVOUR'S Officer-in Command" LCDR Mike Gough, second in command LEUT Adam Farly, together with SNOVIC'S representative CMDR Cam Eastman, to a luncheon presentation at Williamston's Royal Yacht Club. With the two visits to Melbourne by YOUNG ENDEVOR this year, plus a visit by HMAS ships DIAMANTINA, SIRIUS and PERTH, Melbourne played host during a total of 5 port visits by ships of the RAN a far cry from 15 port visits in 2003, 16 in 2004, 19 in 2005 and 14 in 2008. It seems that we are destined to seldom see the White Ensign in ships of the RAN visiting Melbourne, as it is seldom that the ships visit.

During YOUNG ENDEAVOUR'S December 2013 visit, command of the Brig changed from LCDR Mike Gough RAN to LCDR Gavin Dawe RAN.

# **RAN SUBMARINES 1914-2014**

At the time of Federation in1901, the value of submarines as naval warfare vessels was still a hotly debated subject in Australia, as it had been for almost 100 years within British naval circles.

Reluctance to this form of warfare continued, also in Australia until late 1909. However, with the rapid expansion of German naval power in the first 10 years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, one of the ways of meeting the threat of German surface vessels was the decision for the Australian navy to be equipped with submarines.

The submarine was still in its infancy, the first boats for the Royal Navy had been completed only in February of 1903 and by 1911, the largest of the type, a "D" class submarine was only 620 tons submerged.

The two Australian "E" class submarines were formally ordered from England in 1910, with both due for delivery during early 1914. Both submarines, AE1 AND AE2 duly arrived in Australia, berthing firstly in Darwin during early May, then proceeding to Sydney via Cairns arriving in Sydney on Empire Day 24<sup>th</sup> May 1914.

AE1 and AE2 spent the next few months in dockyard hands, undergoing repairs to damage incurred during the delivery voyage from England until the outbreak of World War One in which both boats engaged.

The RAN'S first experience with submarines, as part of the fleet, spanned just two years, with the first boat AE1 lost with all hands whilst on WW1 patrol in New Guinea waters on 14<sup>th</sup> September 1914, and the second boat AE2 without loss of life in the sea of Marmora, Turkey on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1915.

We therefore this year 2014 commemorate the centenary and acknowledge 100 years of submarine operations by the Royal Australian Navy.

Following the end of WW2, a number of RN submarines were based in Australia engaged in various tasks including training and exercises. Included amongst these boats were the "A" class and "T" class submarines operating out of Sydney between the years 1949 to 1969.

The first boats to arrive in Sydney were the "T" class HMS'S TELEMACHUS, THOROUGH and TACTICIAN followed by "A" class AUROCHS, ANDREW and ANCHORITE thereafter "T' class TABARD, TAPIR, TRUMP and TACITURN.

Some members may recall that it was HMS ANDREW that came to Melbourne in the late 1950's to play the role of USS Sawfish" in the movie "On the Beach".

Perhaps it is also apt and fitting that in this year 2014, there are signs that activity may be taking place to further establish the Oberon Class Submarine ex HMAS OTAMA at Western Port Victoria.

OTAMA, was towed from Western Australia almost 12 years ago to become a museum ashore at Hastings Victoria. The submarine has been riding at anchor in Western Port Bay since April of 2002 waiting on final decisions as to how, when and exactly where to bring the boat ashore.

# PORT OF MELBOURNE SHIPS VISITS

One of the most pleasant activities of the Victoria Division of the Navy League of Australia is perhaps the hosting by the League of luncheons for Senior Officers of naval ships visiting Melbourne, all organized, arranged and under the auspices of events coordinator, past president CMDR John Wilkins, OAM RFD\* RANR.

Since the program, under the presidency of John Wilkins restarted in 1996, the League through to the end of 2013, has hosted 85 luncheon-presentations for 101 visiting ships and two stone frigates, HMAS CERBERUS and HMAS CRESWELL.

The visiting ships hosted during that period have been from the navies of Australia, New Zealand, United Kingdom, United States of America, Canada, France, Japan, Italy and Mexico. Many such functions were also held during the presidency of LCDR John Bird RNR between the years 1976 through to 1992.

Whilst the year 2013 saw visits to Melbourne by ships on their way to, or on their way from Sydney's October "Feet Review", the general trend reveals a diminishing pattern of visits to Melbourne by not only ships of the RAN but also of other navies.

# **NAVAL HISTORY**

The month of January is a memorable period in terms of Naval History.

A brief detail of some of the events that occurred during the month of January are listed in the following:-

# **JANUARY 1788**

The supply ship HMS SIRIUS under the command of Captain John Hunter RN., as part of the First Fleet, arrived in Botany Bay. Two years later HMS SIRIUS was wrecked on Norfolk Island.

The current HMAS SIRIUS commissioned into the RAN in 2006. HMAS SIRIUS was originally the tanker MV DELOS converted to RAN specifications to replace the RAN tanker HMAS WESTRALIA 0195.

# **NAVAL HISTORY C'TND**

# **JANUARY 1865**

It was at this point in time that Melbourne became involved in the American Civil War, by providing aid and assistance to the visiting Confederate Navy ship CNS SHENANDOAH.

# JANUARY 1942

It was on 20<sup>th</sup> January1942, that Bathurst Class Minesweeper/Corvettes HMAShips DELORAINE, KATOOMBA and LITHGOW, accompanied by the US Destroyer USS EDSALL, sank the Japanese submarine I-124 in the Arafura Sea. The Commanding Officer of HMAS DELORAINE, LCDR D.A. Menlove, RNR, was

# **JANUARY 1945**

# **VICTORIAN NAVY'S FLAGSHIP CERBERUS**

HMVS CERBERUS in the news again as the ship approaches extinction. The Iron & Timber Veteran of Victoria's Colonial Navy, launched in 1868, is about one storm away from total collapse at her final resting place in Half Moon Bay, Black Rock.

As engineering report on HMVS CERBERUS has sounded the warning that time is running out. Having suffered major damage in a 1993 storm, plunging her main deck under water, the weight of her mighty iron upper works is taking its toll on rotting timbers below the surface. CERBERUS will soon be beyond rescue.

HMVS CERBERUS, once the Flagship and pride of the Victorian Naval Forces was built in England in 1868 and has been described as "The forerunner of the battleship".

At the time of her construction, she was a revolutionary warship containing in her hull the basic features of more recent surface combatants.

By 1924, after 53 years of service to the Victorian Colonial Navy, the Australia Commonwealth Navy and the Royal Australian Navy, CERBERUS was listed for disposal. In 1926, the Black Rock Yacht Club purchased the hull together with the Turrets, Guns and Anchors for 150 pounds. The Club was interested in the hull for use as a breakwater in Half Moon Bay.

ON 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1926 CERBERUS was towed from her berth at Williamstown by the tugs "Agnes & Minah" and drawing 14 feet of water was scuttled at high tide on a sandbank in Half Moon Bay, Black Rock where the water was 15 feet deep.

Though she is still just visible today 136 years since her launching and 77 years since she was scuttled in Half Moon Bay, time and tide and the weight of her 4x10 inch 18 ton guns and turrets have taken their toll.

# FOREIGN SHIPS COULD POSE TERROR THREAT

Australia was particularly vulnerable to terrorist attack from ships because of its reliance on foreign – registered vessels.

Any one of the thousands of foreign ships which dock each year in Australia Ports has the potential to become a weapon of mass destruction.

Australia is making itself more vulnerable than most countries by suppressing Australian shipping in favour of foreign shipping and relying almost totally on offshore-registered ships where the real owners or operators of freighters, tankers and bulk carriers are easily concealed, so said Peter Morris, Australian Maritime Network Chairman, according to a recent media report.

During recent review of Australian shipping, evidence was heard of a conflict between the Governments two aims of cheap shipping and strengthened border protection.

# **RAN'S 'BROLGA' SOLD**

The RAN'S Auxiliary Minesweeper BROLGA was sold at auction in Sydney during December 2003.

BROLGA was one of a number of large and small auxiliary minesweepers acquired by the RAN to provide support for the now laid up two Bay Class Catamaran Minehunters, all of which took place in the late 1980's and early 1990's prior to the introduction of the 6 current Gaeta Class Italian design Coastal Minehunters, two of which are also scheduled to be put into mothballs and will presumably by HMAS HUON No.82 and HMAS HAWKESBURY No.83.

The first large auxiliary minesweeper acquired by the RAN during the period nominated was the former lighthouse tender LUMEN on 2<sup>nd</sup> February 1988, and renamed BROLGA eight days later. The vessel was built in Fremantle in 1975 and purchased for \$410,000.00 after being laid up inactive since April 1987.

In her civilian capacity, the vessel was manned by 17 crew, however, her usual naval crew numbered 8.

With Pendant No.1102, BROLGA inherited this same number from the former British built ton class minesweeper HMAS SNIPE.

BROLGA under the control of her new civilian owners is expected to join the Western Australian fishing fleet in Fremantle, back from whence she came.

# HMAS PERTH NEARS LAUNCHING DATE

Tenix Shipbuilders of Williamstown Victoria, have announced the launching date of their next Anzac Class Frigate.

Nu-ship PERTH is scheduled to be launched at Williamstown on 20<sup>th</sup> March 2004.

The launching of Nu-ship PERTH will bring the total launchings of the Anzac Class ships to ten, of which eight have been ordered by the RAN and two by the RNZN.

This launching will mark the end of the Anzac Class launchings as once HMAS PERTH joins the fleet in 2006, the current Anzac project will be complete.

It could be quite some time before another navy ship is launched at Williamstown, if ever, dependent upon whether Tenix Victoria are successful with RAN contracts to build amphibious ships and, or Air Warfare destroyers.

# Navy updates ship colour scheme for modern war-fighting

The Chief of Navy, Vice Admiral Ray Griggs, has announced that the Navy will progressively change the colour of its surface fleet to meet modern warfighting and regional environmental conditions.

While not normally apparent to the bystander, the recent International Fleet Review with 17 international ships visibly demonstrated that colour schemes do vary significantly between nations.

These are mainly due to the regional environmental conditions faced by national navies such as the percentage of cloud cover or sunlight.

The Royal Australian Navy has traditionally used the Storm Grey colour based upon a traditional northern hemisphere 'Light Grey' which was developed to deter detection under overcast skies. That paint scheme was adopted in the 1950's. With predominant sunlit conditions faced in Australian waters and significant improvements in paint technologies, the Chief of Navy decided to introduce a more appropriate paint scheme. The revised scheme and new paint technologies were reviewed through extensive consultation with the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO) Maritime Group. The basis for the new scheme is around the regionally compatible Haze Grey colour, utilising new technologies in polysiloxane paints with Near Infrared Reflecting Pigments (NIRR).

Research has shown that the polysiloxane paints provide improved durability and fire resistance over older polyurethane systems. The use of reflecting pigments in the Haze Grey formulation reduces external shipboard temperatures by up to 20 degrees Celsius compared to the traditional Storm Grey. This contributes to decreased demand on shipboard environmental systems, a reduced infrared signature for the ship which decreases detection ability, a desirable outcome in combat.

The scheme will be implemented by a phased introduction in scheduled maintenance periods and will yield operational improvements as well as reduce costs and improve technical performance.
