US NAVY DEALS FLOAT AUSTAL'S BOAT

US Navy deals float Austal's boat

SHIPBUILDER Austal has been contracted to make another two combat vessels for the US Navy, bringing the company's forward order book to 10 ships by 2025.

The two additional ships represents Austal's 18th and 19th vessels in the Independence Class.

It has delivered nine of those ships and another 10 are either under construction or awaiting construction.

MANUFACTURING

"This strong order book creates continuity and certainty of workload for the Austal workforce," Austal chief David Singleton said yesterday.

"For our shareholders, the order book will drive continued growth in earnings over the next few years."

In August, Austal more than doubled its full-year profit to \$39 million, driven mainly by its US Navy shipbuilding program, as well as commercial ferry contracts.

The Perth-based company yesterday said for competition reasons the US Navy had not announced the contract value, but has stated that award is under the congressional cost cap of \$US584 million (\$814 million) per ship.

"This latest order from the US Navy is a tremendous endorsement of Austal's unique aluminium trimaran and further evidence of the important role Austal plays in building the United States Navy," Mr Singleton said.

"We have been very successful, winning two Littoral Combat Ships per annum in competitions in each of the last three US government financial years.

Shares in Austal gained 3.8 per cent, or 7c, yesterday to close at \$1.925.

REMAINS OF CAPTAIN MATTHEW FLINDERS DISCOVERED BY ARCHAEOLOGISTS

Archaeologists have discovered the historic remains of Captain Matthew Flinders who led the first circumnavigation of Australia and gave the country its name.

The burial site of the Royal Navy explorer was found almost 205 years after his headstone went missing during the expansion of Euston station in London which extended to the nearby St. James's burial ground.

Archaeologists were "thrilled" to find the iconic explorer, identifying his remains by the breast plate placed on his coffin.

Captain Flinders completed several significant voyages in his lifetime, most notably as commander of the 334 tonne ship *HMS Investigator* which he navigated around the entire Island of Australia, labelled then as the 'Unknown Coast'.

The English-born expeditioner was the first known person to sail around the country in its entirety, confirming it as a continent rather than two separate landmasses previously called New Holland and New South Wales.

Australia's High Commissioner in London George Brandis says the rediscovery of the explorer's remains means he can have a proper memorial "to mark his significance in the Australian story and also his heroic place in the great age of adventure and navigation in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries".

JAPAN TO GET FIRST AIRCRAFT CARRIER SINCE SECOND WORLD WAR AMID CHINA CONCERNS

<u>Japan</u> is to acquire at least one aircraft carrier for the first time since the second world war, as it attempts to counter Chinese maritime expansion in the Pacific Ocean.

The government will upgrade its two existing Izumo-class helicopter carriers so they can transport and launch fighter jets, according to media reports. The plans are expected to be included in new defence guidelines due to be released next month.

This week the Nikkei business paper reported that Japan was poised to buy 100 F-35 stealth jets from the US at a cost of more than US\$8.8bn, a year after <u>Donald Trump</u> urged Tokyo to <u>buy more US-made</u> military equipment.



The reported order is in addition to 42 F-35 jets it has already bought from the US.

Japan's prime minister, Shinzo Abe, told Trump in September that high-spec military equipment would be "important to strengthen Japan's defences".

By refitting its two 248-metre-long Izumoclass vessels, which can each carry up to 14 helicopters, <u>Japan</u> would in effect be acquiring its first aircraft carriers since the end of the war – a move critics say violates its postwar constitutional commitment to a purely defensive role for the military.

Previous Japanese governments have ruled out acquiring aircraft carriers, adhering to the postwar consensus that the vessels' capabilities could be interpreted as offensive, in a possible violation of the country's "pacifist" constitution.

In its latest <u>defence white paper</u>, Japan noted that China had acquired and <u>built aircraft carriers</u> to enable it to expand into Pacific waters near Japan's outlying south-western islands.

Increased Chinese naval activity in waters far from its shores has added to bilateral tensions over the <u>Senkakus</u>, uninhabited islets in the East China Sea that are administered by Japan but claimed by <u>China</u>, where they are known as the Diaoyu.

"It's desirable that the Izumo can be used for multiple purposes," the defence minister, Takeshi Iwaya, told reporters this week.

The carriers will be deployed to defend Japan's remote south-western islands, according to the Mainichi Shimbun.

The defence white paper, published in August, also voiced concern about Chinese military spending and naval activity in the <u>South China Sea</u>.


