MELBOURNE MARITIME HERITAGE NETWORK (MMHN)



Our Division recently joined the Melbourne Maritime Heritage Network (MMHN). The Network was formed “to facilitate cooperation, collaboration and coordination across stakeholder groups.....

The site outlines their vision and has a number of interesting newsletters for your perusal.

On 1 May 2021, Michael O’Brien shared the story of Victoria Harbour and the controversy surrounding the Central Pier at a seminar held at Magnet Galleries in the Docklands. It is hard to believe that this area was once a swamp.

Sir John Coode put forward a plan to develop a port and Joseph Brady modified this plan, proposing to shorten the Yarra River. The construction eventually went ahead and took 5 years due to the depression.

Central Pier was constructed from 1916 to 1919 and at that time, it was the second largest pier in the world. In 1925, 43 US naval ships visiting Melbourne docked there and some 25,000 US crew came ashore.

By 1964, containerization made the Victoria docks unsuitable.

In 2019, Central Pier was declared unsafe. It is now barricaded and about to be demolished, despite being heritage listed.

THE BATTLE OF THE CORAL SEA

For the Allies during World War II, a faint glimmer of hope began to shine in May of 1942, when the Japanese Navy were checked at the Battle of the Coral Sea by the United States Navy and the Royal Australian Navy. The RAN was well represented by the cruisers HMAS AUSTRALIA & HMAS HOBART.

The victory by the US Navy against the Japanese fleet in the following month of June at the Battle of Midway, spelt the turning point of the War in the Pacific leading to the Japanese eventual defeat.

The Battle of the Coral Sea will also be remembered next year (2022) as the 80th Anniversary of that Battle.

In 1992, the 50th Anniversary of the Coral Sea Battle was commemorated in Melbourne by the Victoria Division of the Navy League of Australia, together with the American Australian Association.

An evening reception was held in the restored barque SS “Polly Woodside”. Over 200 people attended the Reception, including the League’s Victoria President LCDR John Bird RNVR RETD, Life Member of the League, plus the Lord Mayor of Melbourne, the Mayors of Port Melbourne and Williamstown, the Consul Generals of the United Kingdom and the United States.

Also in attendance was the Senior Naval Officer Victoria and the Commanding Officers of the visiting United States Navy frigate USS “RUBEN JAMES” and the RAN destroyer HMAS BRISBANE.

My own memories go back to 1954 when on the 7th May, the United State’s Navy Admiral Halsey, with the Victorian Governor Sir Dallas Brooks, took the salute in front of Melbourne’s Town Hall when approximately 3000 marchers from Australia’s current services and ex service personnel marched through Melbourne’s streets to commemorate the 12th Anniversary of the Battle of the Coral Sea.

Included amongst the 3000 marchers were 750 crew members from the visiting US Navy ships, the aircraft carrier USS TARAWA and the Fletcher class destroyer USS O'Bannon.

These commemorative services continued on each May through the 1960s and 1970s, but thereafter began to dwindle in Melbourne. It is heartening, however, to record the sterling efforts by the Naval family groups in Victoria and their supporters, in keeping the memory alive and encouraging the ongoing support during each month of May.

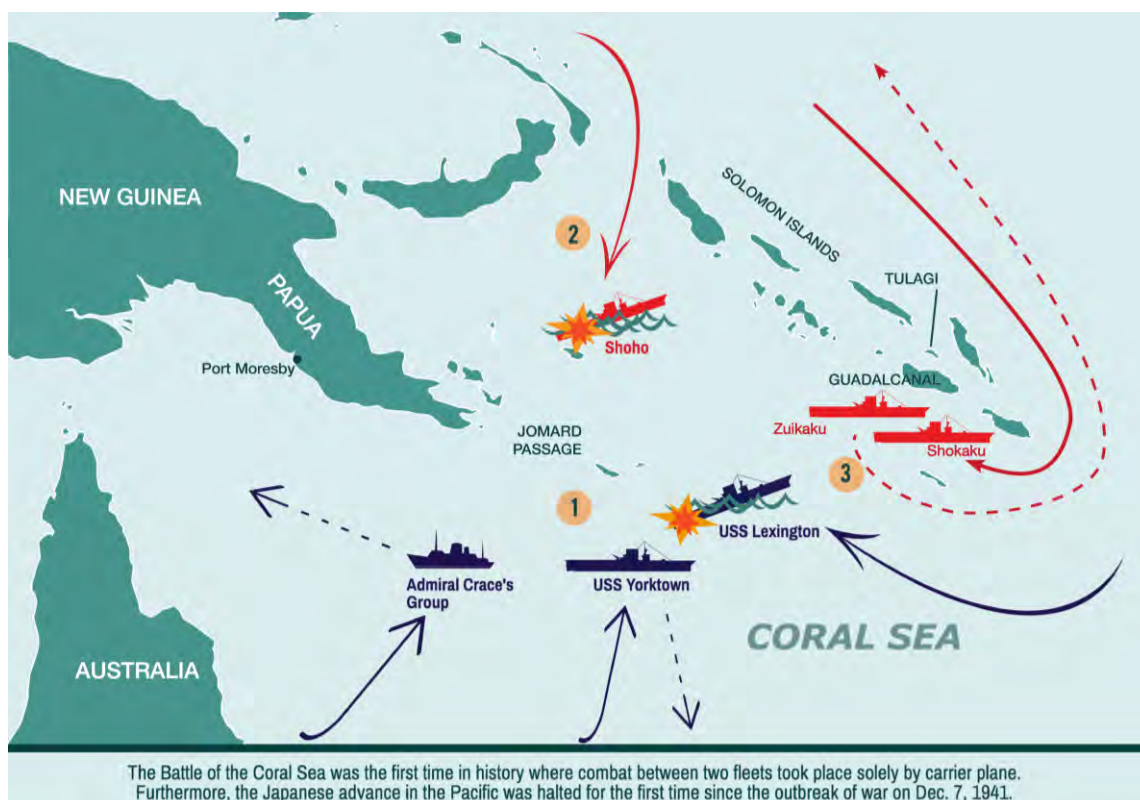
In terms of the actual Battle, some historians are quoted as describing the outcome of the Battle of the Coral Sea as tactically a draw, but in real terms strategically, it was a victory for the Allies. Port Moresby was never again directly threatened by a seaborne invasion; no enemy fleet ever again ventured so far south into the Coral Sea and two damaged Japanese aircraft carriers were unable to be repaired in time to take part in the Battle a month later that stopped Japan's seaborne advance in its tracks: Midway.

It should be remembered also that Melbourne played an important role from the initial stages of the Battle of the Coral Sea by supplying intelligence reports, detailing the likelihood of Japan's intentions towards Port Moresby.

As such, Melbourne was involved in the Coral Sea Battle from the first when locally based signals-intelligence units made a significant contribution to the early detection of the Japanese thrust.

Combining this information with that obtained from coast watchers and aerial reconnaissance, the combined Australian-US Operational Intelligence Centre located in Melbourne, issued an assessment on 25th April 1942, that a Japanese operation to occupy Port Moresby was imminent.

Thus, the code breakers in Melbourne provided invaluable information concerning the Japanese timetable and order of battle for the invasion of Port Moresby up to the very eve of the battle, fought from 4th May to 8th May in 1942. It was the first battle in history where opposing fleets were never in visual contact.

Aboriginal people have served in every conflict and peacekeeping mission involving Australia for more than a century. This is despite the fact that Aboriginal people were not allowed to enlist until the Second World War and for many years their service was not recognised.

In 2006, Auntie Dorothy 'Dot' Peters (1930-2019) sought to change this, and in 2007 the first Victorian Aboriginal Remembrance Service took place. Since then, it has been held every year to honour the service and sacrifice of all Aboriginal servicemen and women.

A 21 Gun Salute to mark the official birthday of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

A 21 Gun Salute on the Lower Forecourt at 12pm will mark the Official Birthday of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the Head of State. Although her actual birthday is 21 April, the reigning

monarch holds an Official Birthday usually in early June to coincide with the finer weather in the northern hemisphere that benefits the outdoor ceremonies. In Victoria this is held on the second Monday in June.

A 21 Gun Salute is a traditional salute firing blanks from an artillery piece or cannon to acknowledge special royal occasions within the United Kingdom and Commonwealth.



N-Class Destroyers

This service remembers the N-Class destroyers, and all those who served aboard them.

The N-Class destroyers were a flotilla of ships built for the British Royal Navy. Early in the

Second World War, 5 were loaned to the Royal Australian Navy to be manned by Australian sailors. The Napier, Nestor, Nizam, Norman and Nepal served in the Mediterranean Sea and the Atlantic, the Pacific and the Indian Oceans.

The date of this service commemorates the sinking of HMAS Nestor on 15 June 1942. While protecting a supply convoy to Malta, the Nestor was heavily damaged by an air attack that killed four sailors. Unable to be salvaged, the ship was scuttled off the coast of Crete.

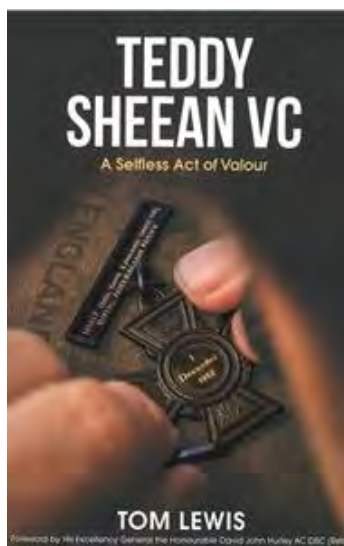

Teddy Sheean VC (Tom Lewis) \$28 *JUST RELEASED*

In 1942, 18-year-old Edward "Teddy" Sheean was one of the youngest and most inexperienced sailors on board the corvette HMAS Armidale. Whilst on operation in the Timor Sea this warship came under heavy attack by Japanese aircraft. Armidale began sinking while swarmed by the Japanese aircraft. Read Teddy's brave fight to the end. It took more than 70 years for Teddy to become the first in Australia's Naval history to receive this highest award - confirming Teddy Sheean is an Australian hero.

Dr Thomas Anthony "Tom" Lewis, OAM is an Australian author, military historian, editor, teacher, and former naval officer. An author since 1989, Lewis worked as a high school teacher, and served as naval officer for 20 years, seeing active service in Baghdad during the Iraq war, and working in East Timor.

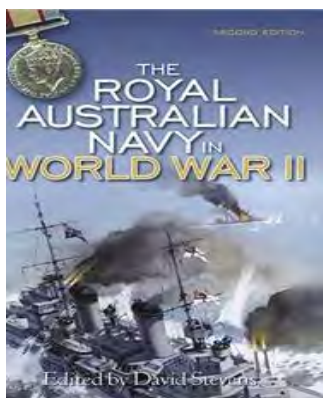
Carrier Attack provides a timely and fresh analysis of the raid. Most importantly, it draws on specially translated Japanese sources. Hard cover, 368 pages.

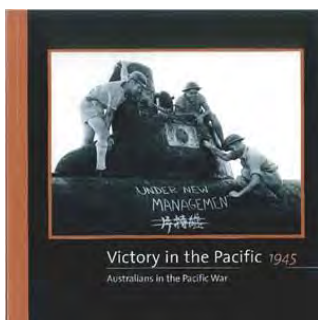


The Royal Australian Navy in World War 2 (Edited by D Stevens) \$48
