#### **FEDERAL COUNCIL MEETING OCTOBER 2023**



Attendees at the Federal Council meeting and AGM 21 October 2023

The Navy League Federal Council meeting was held on 21 October 2023 in Sydney at the State Library. All Divisions were represented with the exception of Western Australia.

The Council was re-elected unanimously with the exception of John Jeremy who retired. All positions were declared vacant. There being no other nominations and on a motion by Graham Harris, the following were elected:

The Victoria Tasmania Division is now heavily represented on the Council, with Senior Vice President LCDR Roger Blythman, Honorary Secretary Ray Gill, Honorary Treasurer Ron Lyon and Minute Secretary Lynda Gilbert.

The Navy League President in his annual report noted in particular the collegiality and ideas sharing. The costs of the Navy Magazine are no longer able to be supported by the NSW Division and will need to be wound back.

The League with careful management will be able to continue its operations indefinitely into the future. The surplus may be put to good use advancing the objectives of the League through scholarships and support of the Navy.



The Navy League ACT Division will start up under the direction of Mark Schweikert. Mark is very focused on revitalizing the League and will build up contacts through Government and the media to influence Government strategy.

Mark has extensive experience in all manner of Defence, security and international matters ranging back to 1991. For 15 years he was one of Defence's most experienced Test & Evaluation strategic plans and policy makers. He also has extensive experience in experimentation. In 2012 he diversified his skill set into local government as a two-term elected Councillor and into regional economic development and board director through his Chairmanship of Regional Development Australia - Southern

Inland. He was elected Deputy Mayor of QPRC in Sept 2018 and stepped down in Sept 2019. He was one of the most active Councillors being Chair of the Economic, Tourism and Traffic committees (to name but a few). He is currently working as a contractor specialising in T&E advice for complex and innovative Defence programmes. #### FEDERAL COUNCIL MEETING CONTINUED

Captain Troy Duggan, Commander of HMAS Adelaide, was invited to speak for 15 minutes prior to the Federal Council AGM.

Captain Duggan noted there are 22 ships and 1950 personnel currently at sea. He spoke of the interdependence of the global economy and the need to protect undersea cables, secure shipping lanes and pipelines.

Freedom of the seas is essential for economies to survive. The uncertainty of the last few years has put strain on the strategic environment. The Global World order is not being adhered to in the Indo Pacific region.

The Navy is needed to protect Australia's interests. Captain Duggan spoke of the 3 Ds - Diplomacy, Deterrents &

Defence. Australia is no longer an island due to long range missiles.

A Defence Strategic Review will take place in 2024 and every 2 years after that. The Navy needs enhanced lethality and long range strike capability. Nuclear submarines, munitions, development of Northern bases, missiles, sea mines, a highly skilled workforce, key partnerships with our Pacific neighbours, are all under review.

The aim is for a win-win situation - sharing of the oceans, cooperation with Singapore, Malaysia and developing Pacific maritime support with a budget of \$2.1 billion to 2027. Looking ahead, the Navy is aiming to grow to 21,000 personnel. It is very challenging at the moment due to low unemployment which is affecting the Navy's ability to fill vacancies. The Navy will be seamless through the ADF and needs to work with partners and allies to uphold a Rules Based Order.

#### SURFACE FLEET REVIEW UPDATE

The Surface Review has been handed to government, and it is expected to be released (together with the government's response) in summary form in early 2024. We can presume the government is undertaking a costing of the options, and talking to AUKUS allies, and NZ, and taking some advice from 'industry'.

### What is happening with 'industry'?

Industry includes - Navantia, BAE Systems, Babcock, ASC, Lurssen, Fincantieri/US Navy shipbuilders, Austal, Korean shipbuilders. Industry is predicting a few main elements of the review, mainly around a fleet of (relatively) heavily armed corvettes or light frigates, a reconfiguration of the Hunter class, and possibly a Hobart class upgrade. BAE has come out strongly showing a heavily modified Hunter Class frigate packing more punch than the current Hobart configuration. Industry is now putting out press releases describing their offers that they hope will accurately reflect the review proposals. What is clear - there is no shortage of industry options to consider, and, it seems, no shortage of capacity in European shipyards. Industry commentators are currently in a fevered debate over the worthiness of Tier 1 ships versus Tier 2. Information sources include Defence Connect, ASPI, BAE Systems, Navantia, DoD. This debate is set on whether the review will have a greater emphasis on protecting our 'approaches' - near northern waters - littoral/archipeligo, or more blue water, further from our shores - ie offensive posturing.

#### **Predictions?**

An ideal scenario would have a balanced surface navy, able to project far offshore, and to protect our 'approaches'.

- There will be a reconfiguration of the Hunter class to pack many more VLS cells. Perhaps one tranche (of 3 shipsets) will retain the current planned anti-sub focus, and the two following tranches (x6) will be at Hobart+ levels of offensive capability. These will omit their towed array sonar, and the mission bay on the midships hump behind the funnels, and add 64 VLS cells and Naval Ship Missiles (Anti-ship and ship to shore).
- The three Hobart class will get enhanced lethality, with NSMs and updated CIWS.
- Some or all of the eight 8 ANZACs will get a life extension through to late 2030's, and extra missile launchers and inventory.
- A fleet of 8 corvettes (circa 2,000 tonnes disp) will be commissioned, each with similar lethality to the current Hobart weapon set.
- This combined fleet will, by 2035 comprise circa 20 ships in Tier 1 and 2 categories, resulting in a continuous peacetime availability of approx 13 Tier 1 and 2 ships
- The Arafura class build will be paused and the whole class of 12 ships will have their small 25mm guns upgraded to something more lethal with longer range.
- A massive investment will be made in unmanned technologies, for above, on and below the water deployment.
- An equally massive investment will be made in sea mines and smart sea channel and sensor technologies.

• Navy will reconfigure the standard ship's complement with multi-crewing for the smaller vessels, as is already done with the patrol boat fleet on a 3 crew/2 ship basis. Multi-crewing is already practised in the submarine service. (Multi-crewing permits more time at sea for each vessel, while still providing for appropriate rest and training cycles). This is becoming repetitive – the navy will need to double its sailor headcount by the early 2030's.

A safe prediction: By 2030 - the ADF will have a large inventory of short, medium and long range missiles deployed by sea, air and land forces. Many of these will be made in Australia. Important note on missile technology developments: the Ukraine armed forces have shown how extraordinarily accurate some European sourced anti-ship / surface to surface missiles are – the 'Storm Shadow' has been able to destroy small moving targets at a range beyond 500kms.

Another prediction: nothing will change until another review takes place!
