From Bravo Zulu Volume 2 1975-2014 by our friend Dr Ian Pfennnigwerth Page 88 re HMAS SWAN:

In May 1975 HMAS *Swan* succeeded in a particularly difficult rescue of the crew of a yacht in difficulties off Broken Bay NSW. In appalling weather, the frigate responded to a distress call and found the yacht *Cutty Sark* dismasted and foundering. With 75 knot winds, ten metre seas and the frigate rolling 45 degrees, efforts to bring the ship alongside the yacht almost met with disaster, but one yachtsman managed to grab *Swan's* scrambling net when the two vessels met. Three volunteers, Petty Officer David Krietling from Bunbury NSW, and Able Seamen Robert Lindsley from Bondi NSW and Dallys Ruhl from Hervey Bay QLD, all qualified divers, swam with lines 50 metres to the yacht and, with difficulty transferred the other yachtsmen to the frigate. Ruhl had to assist one who had injured his back to get onboard. When the yachtsmen had been recovered, *Cutty Sark* was cut adrift and Lindsley and Krietling made the 100 metre swim back to *Swan*, approaching exhaustion from their efforts. Krietling was awarded the Royal Humane Society silver medal, while Lindsley and Ruhl received Bronze Medals.
