On August 29, 2017 Alf Batchelder and I visited the USS Bonhomme Richard, a Wasp-class amphibious assault ship (Landing LHD6). Her primary mission is to embark, deploy, and land elements of a Marine landing force in amphibious assault operations by helicopter, landing craft and amphibious vehicles and she has the capacity to be a light aircraft carrier when required. When we toured the ship, the F35B Fighters she carries had been flown off. With a displacement of 41,006 tons

she is a larger version of our Canberra class LHD's. She is a very impressive ship and it was with profound distress that we learnt of the calamitous fire damage which occurred. As previously reported

the fire began on Sunday July 12 and there is an

Marty Grogan and I journeyed down to Dromana on June 18 to visit Gerry Shepherd. Gerry served in the RAN in both WWII and the Korean conflict. On his 17th birthday he made himself available to serve in the Navy, however he wasn't called up until July 4 1944, thirteen months later. Gerry was a member of the Commissioning crew of the Tribal Class destroyer, HMAS Bataan. She was launched in January 1944 and commissioned 25 May 1945. She proceeded to the Philippines in July 1945 and from there was sent to Japan, reaching Tokyo on 31 August 1945 to take part in the surrender ceremony, which took place on 2 September. Bataan remained in Japanese waters assisting with the evacuation of allied prisoners of war and as the Australian Squadron representative until 18 November 1945 when she sailed from Tokyo to return to Australia. In 1946 Gerry served in both the corvette HMAS *Lismore* and the Tank landing ship HMAS *LST 3008*.

With the advent of the Korean War in 1950, Gerry re-enlisted in the RAN and during the conflict he served in both HMAS Anzac and HMAS Bataan.

Over the years since the Wars, Bataan as well as his fellow crewmates have been very special to Gerry. He has been very active in his Bataan Association. He obtained the Admiralty plans of the ship and undertook the building of a model of her to scale and which is meticulous in its detail. Truly a magnificent model as the photos(below) prove! Both Marty and I were most impressed when we viewed it.

At Gerry's request, Marty contacted our friend John Perryman, the Director of Strategic and Historical Studies at our Sea Power Centre in Canberra to ascertain if Sea Power would like to provide a suitable home for the model.

Upon viewing the photos, John enthusiastically accepted Gerry's offer and thus this excellent model is assured a prominent position at Sea Power to be enjoyed by many, indeed when the current Covid position eases Gerry and members of his family intend to go to Canberra and view her in her new home. They will be made very welcome.

Gerry now lives in a beautiful spot in Dromana overlooking the bay. Still involved in local affairs, he is an active member in the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard Dromana, having been a member for many years.
