Rex's Odyssey: Part 2: Whilst I was staying with my friends Gill and John Davies in Three Crosses, a small village, just on the edge of the Gower Peninsular, John and I drove up to Monmouth for the day. My ancestors came from this area in South Wales, but in this case the purpose of our visit was to conduct research at the 'Nelson Museum' there. I had contacted the curator prior to my visit and she kindly arranged access to their library. My particular interest was to research the women in Lord Nelson's life. Nelson's mother was a member of the Walpole family and it was through her brother Captain Maurice Suckling RN that he got his start in the Navy. He formed an attachment to a married woman Mary Moutray in Antigua, and also had a relationship with a 'Dolly' in Leghorn. He met and eventually married widow Frances Nisbet on the island of Nevis in the Caribbean. The love of his life was Emma Hamilton and she was able to provide him with the child he had long wanted. What a fascinating woman Emma was! Eventually I'll share with you the results of my research, but another time!

The Museum celebrates the visit of Nelson and the Hamiltons' to Monmouth in 1802. Cheering crowds greeted them everywhere they went during the three month tour of Wales which also included Milford Haven, Swansea and Cardiff. I took many photos in the museum, some of which we'll share with you in this 'Dog'. The 'Nelson' collection of Lady Llangattock, (the mother of Charles Rolls, of Rolls Royce fame,) was donated to the town in 1924 and contains many interesting artifacts including Nelson's fighting sword plus the swords of French and Spanish naval commanders from Trafalgar. There are a number of his letters both to his wife and to Emma plus a death mask, and various ship models etc. *Enjoy the photos.*
