Each year, there is normally a wreath laying service at the Shrine of Remembrance to honour the service and sacrifice of those who served aboard N-Class Destroyers. Unfortunately, due to ongoing COVID restrictions this year's service has been cancelled. There will be a virtual service streamed by the Shrine of Remembrance at 1100 on 29th August. In recognition of the significant contribution made by the N-Class Destroyers we have dedicated this month's editorial to all those who served aboard them.

History and War Service of the N Class

The N-Class destroyers were a flotilla of ships built for the Royal Navy. Early in WW2, five were loaned to the RAN to be manned by Australian sailors. The *Napier*, *Nestor*, *Nizam*, *Norman* and *Nepal* subsequently served in the Mediterranean Sea and the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans.

The RAN's 'N' Class Destroyers displaced 2,500 tons, length 356½ft, beam 35ft, and a draught of 16ft. Armament was 6×4.7" guns (in three mountings), Oerlikon AA guns, 45 depth charges with two

throwers, 10x21" torpedoes, speed – 36 knots and complement of 226 officers and ratings. At a cost of around £600,000, they were built in various British shipyards and commissioned over the period 1940-41 with the exception of *Nepal*, who due to extensive bomb damage during construction, had to be practically rebuilt before commissioning in 1942.

Napier and *Nizam* served initially in the Eastern Mediterranean where they arrived towards the end of May 1941 just in time for the evacuation of Crete in which they played a prominent part embarking hundreds of members of the Australian Army's 6th Division. After taking part in support of the land forces involved in the Syrian campaign, both ships were then engaged in what has been dubbed the "Tobruk Ferry Service" supplying the besieged garrison with much needed stores, ammunition, exchange troops and bringing out wounded. *Nizam* did no less than 14 round trips, including the last carried out in full moonlight. Other duties for both ships included fleet and convoy escort including those involved in the relief of Malta.

Meantime *Nestor's* area of operation was confined more to the Atlantic and Western Mediterranean where among other exploits she was credited with the destruction of a U-boat. She eventually joined *Napier* and *Nizam* in Alexandria in December 1941, but more on *Nestor's* war service later.

Norman commissioned in September 1941 and after trials commenced escort duties in the North Atlantic. Then a voyage from Iceland to Russia with a British trade delegation to Archangel. In January 1942, *Norman* left England in a huge convoy down the South Atlantic to South Africa. The four sister ships were finally united in Trincomalee, then a British Naval Base on the East coast of Ceylon (now Sri Lanka), where they formed part of a newly established British Eastern Fleet.

The newest N class Destroyer, *Nepal*, commissioned 1st May 1942, joined the other N boats in November and set to work with them in the Eastern Fleet. For the remainder of 1942 and early 1943 the 'N's were engaged in combating a serious U - boat threat to Allied shipping around the Cape of Good Hope.

1944 saw the ships kept busy fulfilling the constant demand for convoy protection duties in addition to acting as part of the screen for the Fleet when engaged in offensive operations against the

Severn resurrects wartime paint scheme as she rejoins the Naval family. The combination of blue-grey and green-grey on a background of white and light grey was first applied to destroyer HMS *Broke* in 1940.

The Royal Australian Navy will join key regional partners India, Japan and the United States for Exercise MALABAR 2021. Anzac class frigate HMAS *Warramunga* will join ships and aircraft from participating nations for the high-end military exercise off the coast of

Japanese. In December 1944 the 'N's were based temporarily at Chittagong at the head of the Bay of Bengal from where they were engaged in supporting the British Army troops in their push against the Japanese along the coast of Burma. Action included bombardment from the sea of enemy positions in mountainous country, transporting commandos and other assault troops and pre-landing bombardment of Japanese held beaches.

The formation by 1945 of a British Pacific Fleet based on Sydney meant that the 'N's could at last be stationed in Australia to join with the rest of the RAN in the final months of the Pacific War. On 1st April 1945 they left Sydney and headed north to join the Fleet which was operating in the Okinawa area, returning to Sydney briefly in June for repairs and boiler cleaning. Then northwards again to re-join the British Fleet which had by then linked up with three US Task Forces in an area close to Japan from where sustained air attacks were being made on the Japanese mainland by carrier based planes.

The presence of *Napier*, *Nizam*, *Norman* and *Nepal* in Tokyo Bay on 2nd September 1945 when surrender documents were signed on board USS Missouri was a fitting finale to their illustrious record of active service since 1941.

With the end of hostilities, they spent short deployments in Japanese waters, before returning to Sydney, and in October 1945, *Napier*, *Nizam*, *Norman* and *Nepal* were returned to Royal Navy control. They served in the RN till disposed of in the mid-1950s. Only *Nestor* was lost in action.

Nestor was commissioned on the Clyde on 3 February 1941 under the command of Commander George Stewart, RAN. She joined the Home Fleet based at Scapa Flow and spent the first months of

Guam in the Indo-Pacific.

Putin launches construction of six warships and submarines for Russian Navy

"Every single one of us that went, knows the difference we made on the ground when we were over there." These are the words of one contemporary veteran who I met with following the unfolding events in Afghanistan.

The crew of Royal Australian Navy frigate HMAS Ballarat has been welcomed back to Garden Island, Western Australia after four months deployed.

Capt. Amy Bauernschmidt is now the commanding officer of the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln — becoming the first woman to lead a nuclear carrier in U.S. Navy history.

One of the darkest hours in the history of women serving in the Royal Navy was remembered in Yeovilton today – 80 years on from the tragedy. In August 1941 the SS Aguila left for Portugal and Gibraltar with nearly 1,300 tonnes of general cargo and almost 100 military personnel embarked. Among the passengers: nine female officers and 12 ratings of the Women's Royal Naval Service, the latter all hand-picked chief wireless telegraphers assigned to the communications centre at the naval air station in Gibraltar.

Petty Officer Electronics Technician Emma Barnett joined the Navy as a gap year sailor and is living proof you can do anything you put your mind to.

Russia's secretive special survey ship Yantar raises eyebrows when she appears off Western shores. She has previously been noted conducting operations off Syria, in the Persian Gulf and off Americas. Now she is off the coast of Ireland, loitering in the vicinity of

service escorting North Atlantic convoys, on patrol and screening the fleet capital ships at sea.

Commander Stewart was replaced as Commanding Officer in early May 1941 and Commander Alvord Rosenthal RAN, became the new Commanding Officer. In late May, *Nestor* was a unit of the force which hunted and sank the German battleship *Bismarck*, although having been diverted to Iceland to refuel she was not with the force when the *Bismarck* was eventually sunk on 27 May 1941.

In July 1941 *Nestor* entered the Mediterranean for the first time when she operated as one of the escorts for the passage of important Malta convoys (Operation SUSTENANCE). In August she saw further Mediterranean service before proceeding on escort duties to the South Atlantic. In October 1941 she returned to England for repairs and refit.

Escort duties were resumed on 5 December 1941 when she sailed from Devonport to rendezvous with a Gibraltar bound convoy. On 15 December, off Cape St Vincent, she sighted the German submarine *U-127* on the surface at a distance of about seven miles. *Nestor* opened fire with her main armament, forcing the U-boat to dive, and after gaining contact made a successful attack with depth charge. She was later officially credited with the destruction of *U-127* which was lost with all hands.

On Christmas Eve 1941 *Nestor* returned to Malta. Two days later she proceeded as one of the escorts of a convoy bound for Alexandria and on 30 December, sailed from that port on the screen

Ex-service organisations from across the nation have met with the Australian Government today to throw their support behind efforts underway to assist veterans and families impacted by the situation in Afghanistan.

The Navy is sending the amphibious warship USS Arlington (LPD-24) to assist with the humanitarian aid mission in Haiti in the aftermath of an Aug. 14 earthquake, Pentagon officials said on Tuesday. The aftermath of the 7.2 magnitude earthquake has killed at least 1,941 and wreaked havoc across the southwestern Tiburon Peninsula.

Victoria's COVID-19 Household Engagement Program has continued its vital work over the past month, assisted by personnel from the ADF.

Communications, remote sensing and precision navigation and timing for warships and submarines is becoming more and more important – and satellite technology is making the process that much easier.

For Staff Officer Navy Cyber Operations Chief Petty Officer Kathleen Price, no two days are the same. Working at Navy's Information Warfare team, she ensures Navy has the right people, skills, equipment and resources to combat the growing threat of cyber information warfare to Defence's warfighting capability.

The Royal Australian Navy's Lieutenant Commander Josh Cowell gained amphibious warfare experience while recently deployed on operations in the Baltic Sea region with the Royal Navy Littoral Response Group (North) aboard HMS Albion.

As a child growing up in Lebanon, Lieutenant Commander Fatena El-Masri dreamed of being an astronaut, but she

of the heavy ships for the bombardment of Bardia in Libya, prior to its capture by the British 8th Army.

In January 1942 *Nestor* left the Mediterranean theatre to support operations to reinforce Malaya. On reaching Aden, she was ordered to join the escort of the aircraft carrier HMS *Indomitable*, engaged on ferrying aircraft to the Malayan/Java theatre. The operation successfully concluded, the carrier and her escort proceeded to Port Sudan to load a second flight of planes. Too late to land them in Malaya (Singapore had fallen), they were flown off some 100 miles off Colombo in time to take part in the defence of that port against the first Japanese air attack. Parting from *Indomitable*, *Nestor* proceeded to Trincomalee and after docking at Colombo joined the Eastern Fleet.

In late March and early April *Nestor* was engaged on patrol and escort duties in the Indian Ocean and on the screen of the Fleet. Following a visit to the temporary base of the Eastern Fleet at Kilindini (East Africa) she proceeded on an exercise cruise to Zanzibar and in June returned to the Mediterranean.

At Haifa in June 1942, in company with HMAS *Norman*, she was joined by HMA Ships *Napier* and *Nizam*, forming the 7th Destroyer Flotilla for Operation VIGOROUS, the passage of an east to west Malta convoy. The total covering force comprised eight cruisers and twenty-six destroyers supported by corvettes and nine submarines.

Enemy air attacks carried out almost exclusively by land based aircraft began almost as soon as the convoy left Alexandria. Early attacks were concentrated on the cruisers and the eleven ships of the convoy but later the destroyers became the principal targets.

At about 1800 on 15 June 1942, when the convoy was off the south west corner of Crete, *Nestor* was straddled by a stick of heavy bombs which caused serious damage to her No.1 boiler room and killed four of her personnel.

Other losses in the attempt to reach Malta from the east included one cruiser, two destroyers, and two merchant ships sunk. Three cruisers, one destroyer and one corvette were damaged.

The Commanding Officer of the *Nestor* during much of her service and at the time of its sinking was Commander A.S. Rosenthal, who went to a successful post war career. It is therefore very appropriate that he is recognised as our naval hero for the month of August.

Commodore Alvord Sydney Rosenthal



Alvord Sydney Rosenthal was born on 16 January 1901 at Lewisham, Sydney and educated at The King's School, Parramatta. In 1915 he entered the RAN College at Jervis Bay, from which he graduated in 1918.

In the history of the Australian N Class destroyers, published by the Naval Historical Society of Australia in 1972, they paid the following tribute to Rosenthal:

'He was one of those rare individuals, a man of ultra-quick decision. For a ship at war, it had to be the right decision

Hobart-class Air Warfare Destroyers have reached final operational capability after the third ship, HMAS Sydney, completed a successful test and evaluation period off the coast of the US and Canada.

HMAS Supply, one of Navy's two new Auxiliary Oiler Replenishment (AOR) ships, has completed its first ever Replenishment at Sea (RAS) with HMAS Anzac. This first RAS marks a significant milestone for Navy's refuel and resupply at sea capability, which is critical to extending time at sea for Australian and allied ships.

The crews of Australian Armadale-class patrol boat HMAS Glenelg and Republic of Fiji Guardian-class patrol boat RFNS Savenaca have worked together to build the mariner skills of personnel. Glenelg was deployed on Operation Solania supporting the Pacific Island Forum Fisheries Agency (FFA).

The ship's company of HMAS Glenelg shared an unforgettable experience with one of Australia's closest regional partners on July 30.

Minister for Defence Personnel and Veterans' Affairs Andrew Gee has today announced significant amendments to the Defence Force Discipline Act 1982 which will modernise and streamline disciplinary matters in the Australian Defence Force. "Our military justice system provides the Australian Defence Force with a unique Australian legal framework that is able to be applied on operations anywhere in the world," Minister Gee said.

The Australian Defence Force and the United States Armed Forces will partner to develop a new precision missile capability to further interoperability and modernise both militaries. in a moment of crisis, and NESTOR's illustrious career in a very large measure was due to the man who commanded her. Invariably relaxed and cheerful when off-duty or in harbour, at sea he drove the ship and her complement hard, but it was what everyone expected. He was the master of his profession as a destroyer-man. A capable ship-handler, a meticulous navigator, and insatiably interested in the day-to-day details of the ship's affairs that matter for fighting efficiency. Of bright and breezy personality, forthright and outspoken – not always to senior officers' liking – he was highly regarded by his brother captains in the various fleets in which Nestor served.

Alvord spent his retirement at Frankston, indulging his hobby of model making. He died on 20 July 1975 at Heidelberg and was cremated. For his full biography is on our website:

373,500 Australians have served in the Australian Defence Force over the past 35 years, of which 59,000 are currently serving, according to new statistics released today by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

Despite the challenges faced in 2020 because of COVID-19, the team at HMAS Cerberus in Victoria defied the odds with a record number of blood donations; a record they hope to surpass when the challenge kicks off in September.

The Navy's Anzac Class frigate fleet is one step closer to operating next-generation sovereign air search radar technology. The SEA 1448 Phase 4B project — which aims to replace the SPS-49(V)8 Air Search Radar on the Royal Australian Navy's fleet of eight Anzac Class frigates with a CEAFAAR-2L phased array radar system — has officially achieved initial operating capability (IOC).

Ten thousand veterans with complex mental health needs will have access to a network of qualified GPs nationwide, following the expansion of support provided by the Australian Government. Minister for Veterans' Affairs Andrew Gee today announced the Coordinated Veterans' Care (CVC) Program has been expanded to provide additional support for DVA White Card holders with an accepted mental health condition.

The Navy Band will soon have a new selection of ceremonial music to support the fleet. Navy Band Melbourne recently recorded a revitalised selection at Oaklands Studios, Melbourne, to ensure that in its absence from an event, the Navy music catalogue contains everything required to hold a memorial

The RAN's oldest ship, First Lady of the Fleet HMAS Paluma IV, has conducted a final Freedom of Entry in the lead up to decommissioning next month.

Defending a large task group comprising five nations was a challenge for HMAS Parramatta – but with the assistance of her embarked helicopter, it was mission success.

British hackers have joined a US-based cyber security team in a bid to upskill in the fight against malicious actors. The UK Ministry of Defence has sponsored 26 'ethical hackers' to participate in a 'Bug Bounty' program in collaboration with US-based organisation HackerOne.

HMA Ships Canberra and Ballarat have arrived in the Western Pacific Ocean for the opening phase of the US-led Large Scale Global Exercise 21.

The Indian Ocean is an increasingly contested strategic environment. A growing Chinese naval presence raises the prospect that Beijing may seek to challenge US naval dominance, potentially sparking a competitive naval arms race in the region.
