



2019 ANL Maritime Art Prize & Exhibition

## Entries Open 1 May – 30 August

Stories of life at sea are seafarer stories. We hear them every day at the Mission to Seafarers Victoria (MtSV). The sea is a majestic, mysterious and powerful force that awes us and reminds us of our insignificance and mortality at every opportunity. It can also be a benign and peaceful beauty to relax with and enjoy, and it supports and protects a whole world of other living things for us to explore, as well as the shipping industry. Maritime art is a genre significant to Australians, as the sea embraces our country with 25,760 kilometres of coastline.

That's why the theme for the 2019 ANL Maritime Art Prize is 'the Relationship of Humanity to the Sea'

The ANL Maritime Art prize attracts around 300 entries, with a finalist selection of 80 artworks, who compete for five awards including the major Maritime Art Prize, Best in Traditional, Runners Up Award, Emerging Artist, and the People's Choice. The Maritime Art Prize is an acquisitive award of \$15,000, sponsored by ANL Containers. Previous award recipients include Joni Dennis, Ted Dansey, Mary Hyde, Jamie Preisz, and David Rowe, to name but a few. Amongst the traditional beauty of oil paintings and watercolours of maritime subjects in the exhibition, last year's winners demonstrated a move to include more contemporary works in the finalists of the Maritime Art Prize, with the overall winner being a mixed media work by Joni Dennis with a feminist representation of women ship captains.

The event aims to raise the profile of our international seafarers and is the fundraising initiative of the MtSV. The MtSV inhabits an enchanting and iconic building in Docklands; well worth a visit any day of the year, but particularly to see the ANL Maritime Art Prize in October, set up throughout the public areas of the building, including in the Norla Dome. The longevity of the Prize - running for seventeen years - is evidence of the recognition both artists and the public have for the reputation of the Mission to Seafarers Victoria's, ANL Maritime Art Prize.
