devoted to the history of the Victorian Navy. Over the coming months, such a resource will be developed with the assistance of the Victorian Chapter of the Naval Historical Society of Australia. Keep an eye open for it as it promises to be both interesting and informative.

I recently had the privilege of reading a new publication by John Wilkins OAM RFD* entitled "Stone Frigates - Port Melbourne, Port Phillip & Victoria's Colonial and Commonwealth Navies, 1856 – 1992". It tells of the birth and growth of the Victorian Colonial Navy from the period of the gold rush when officials grew concerned over the security of the increasing wealth of the colony, through the decades until the decommissioning of HMAS Lonsdale in November 1992.

Of particular interest to me was the early history of Victoria's Navy, which effectively began with the arrival of HMVS Victoria on 31st May 1856. The Victorian Naval force subsequently grew to a fleet of 24 armed vessels, manned by permanent career trained crews which formed the backbone of the integrated force that, according to John, made Port Phillip the most heavily defended port in the British Empire.

John's book also identifies Victoria's significant contribution to the defence of early Australia when on 1st March 1901 all colonies transferred their Naval & Military assets to the Commonwealth. Victoria's contribution to the fledgling Australian Navy was considerable, as at the time it had a naval force outnumbering all other colonies. Of the assets transferred, John records that Victoria supplied six of the 14 warships as well as two-thirds of all career naval personnel.

HMAS Castlemaine will be good for another 10 years. On Friday 14 & 15 August Castlemaine cold moved from Gem Pier to the Graving Dock at BAE (WilDock) for a 10 yearly below water checkup. The removal of 10 years of marine growth from the hull showed that the hull was in good condition, a testament to the paint quality and preparation last time the ship was docked. On completion of the hull maintenance the ship will move from BAE back to her long term berth at Gem Pier Williamstown. The capacity to keep the museum ship viable is through public donations. The Castlemaine receives no government funding. Docking is an



expensive but necessary requirement. Special thanks to the BAE dockyard workers who donated their time for the docking. This is most commendable, particularly at a time when their further employment is uncertain. *Castlemaine*, an icon of the Williamstown waterfront is a must see for anyone interested in our naval heritage. *Castlemaine*, an Australian Minesweeper was one of 60 built during WWII by Australian Shipbuilders. *Castlemaine* was built at Williamstown and commissioned in 1942. Like the rest of the fleet of



Minesweepers, besides her primary role she was used for convoy escort and support tasks for Australian and Allied troops engaged in guerrilla operations. Her battle honours include Darwin, Pacific and New Guinea. She was involved in the earlier part of the same action where HMAS Armidale was lost. De-commissioned in 1945. Castlemaine was used as a training platform for engineering and damage control instruction at HMAS Cerberus, this lasted for 20 years. Since 1978 the Castlemaine has been maintained as a museum ship by a team of volunteers. There are volunteers of various backgrounds, a WWII Veteran in his nineties amongst their ranks. The ship has been faithfully restored to its war time condition. The original machinery is functional and regularly turned over. Internal exhibits of a naval nature show the link between maritime and Williamstown, going back to colonial navy days. Castlemaine will be open every weekend from 29AUG, a great place to visit with friends - have a look around an historic warship of yester year. A Navy Plaque for Gippsland

The East Gippsland Sub-Section, Naval Association of Australia has arranged a memorial plaque for the Beaufort Gardens, Bairnsdale in memory of those who lost their lives during service in the RAN. The name Beaufort Gardens was inspired by the Beaufort bomber which, when constructed in Australia beginning from August 1941, was a unique and creditable industrial achievement. A total of 700 Beauforts were built in Australia. The Beaufort Gardens were established around the Beaufort Memorial which was dedicated on 14th November



The Memorial records the initial presence of the RAAF units at Bairnsdale, East Gippsland and commemorates the efforts of the airmen and airwomen who served in East Gippsland during World War II of whom 192 from RAAF bases Bairnsdale, East Sale and West Sale lost their lives during local operations and training. The Hudson and Anson aircraft were also flown from RAAF bases in East Gippsland but were not made in Australia. The gardens also note the deeds of all Servicemen and women in recent conflicts, including memorials for National Servicemen, the MN, women's services & peace keepers/makers. No. 7 Squadron, equipped with Hudson and later Beaufort aircraft, established No. 1 Operational Training Unit at Bairnsdale in April-May 1942. After operational service many experienced RAAF crews were posted to Bairnsdale as instructors. They trained inexperienced crews for operational duties prior to their transfer to Hudson and Beaufort squadrons in PNG and Darwin. The hazards were such that the aircraft casualty rate at Bairnsdale and Sale was very high. The plaque will be unveiled at 1100 on Sunday, 4OCT15.

Navy Cadets - Barwon



Victory in the Pacific

The 70th Anniversary of the Victory in the Pacific was held across Australia on Saturday, 15AUG15. In Melbourne several hundred Service, ex-Service men & women, along with friends and family attended the commemorative service before the Cenotaph, Shrine of Remembrance. The host was Air Vice Marshall Chris Spence AO, Chairman of Shrine of Remembrance Trustees. The address was delivered



chilly morning in 1945, somewhat different to this sunny day. The Governor spoke of Prime Minister Ben Chifley declaring that the war is over and the unprecedented scenes of celebration across Australia, the result of six years of pent-up emotion! The Governor paid tribute to the one million men and women who fought for Australia around the world; noted the scale of their bravery and fortitude, sustained over such a long time. Her address covered the tragic loss of over 8,000 Australians, who made the supreme sacrifice whilst fighting on the Pacific front, with a further 22,000 imprisoned by the Japanese. Some Veterans commented on the bombing of Japan, saying two bombs were not enough, most grateful that it brought an end to the war & Victory in the Pacific.

ANZAC Centenary

Whilst Naval activity was minimal, August was a tragic month at Gallipoli. Several days of aggressive action during August witnessed the loss of thousands of Australian soldiers. The tragedy was a repeated failure of Allied Command to make any real sense of the issues regarding loss of life. A service was held at the Shrine of Remembrance where the sacrifice by Australian and New Zealand soldiers was commemorated. The service recounted other offensives not yet at their centennial milestone. Pictured below is the mock up of the landing craft used at Gallipoli. This craft was refurbished at Cerberus and used during the march last ANZAC Day, designed to represent the Navy Bridging Team at Gallipoli, last out! ONCE NAVY, ALWAYS NAVY!
