### Editorial

#### NVN current membership: 1068

Five months after the second 'Combined Associations Workshop' that was held at the Mission to Seafarers on 4 Mar 17, the organisers (from the MNC, NCCV and NAA) thought it might be worth "checking-in" with the representatives from the 23 ex-Navy Associations in Victoria who attended the workshop (and the Presidents of the other Associations who were unavailable for that workshop) and ask how they're going with the implementation of a range of initiatives that were agreed as having potential to assist with the "*reinvigoration of the ex-Navy community in Victoria*".

As a reminder, the key initiatives included:

- Encourage all members of all ex-Navy Associations (who aren't already signed-up) to register with the Navy Victoria Network (NVN) as a free and easy way to stay abreast of what events are happening in Victoria that might be of interest to ex-Navy personnel (and to read about other newsworthy nautical matters).
- For those ex-Navy personnel who aren't 'computer literate', there was a suggestion that Association executives ought to ascertain whether a close relative or friend could act as an 'intermediary' by registering with the NVN and passing hard copies of the monthly Newsletters to their less 'tech-savvy' members.
- Encourage all ex-Navy Associations to give the NVN webmaster a short description of their Association, it's purpose, main annual activities and key points of contact which can be included in the 'Associations' folder on the web-site. (This will contribute to the achievement of another objective of the

Workshop; that being to improve the interconnectivity and contactability of all ex-Navy Associations in Victoria.)

- Encourage all ex-Navy Associations to utilise the 'Calendar' folder on the NVN web-site as a means to advertise meetings and other planned activities for their members and other potentially interested readers of the web-site.
- Encourage the Presidents of all ex-Navy Associations to prepare a short (less than 1 page) article (once per year) about their Association and any noteworthy events they're planning (eg. reunions) which can be included in the NVN's monthly Newsletters which are distributed to over 1000 registered members and read by many more.
- For those Associations which are struggling to cover administration costs or need financial assistance to run an important event for their members, remind them that (within the constraints of their charter) the Melbourne Naval Committee (MNC) would be happy to consider requests for support.
- Reiterate that all ex-Navy Associations are encouraged to book and utilise the excellently appointed 'River Room' leased by the MNC from the Mission to Seafarers (717 Flinders Street, Docklands) for meetings and functions or, if their members are just passing through the city, remind them that they are also welcome to simply pop in and use the bar and tea/coffee facilities in this beautiful and centrally-located heritage building.
- As a means of strengthening the bonds of camaraderie within the ex-Navy community in Victoria, encourage all ex-Navy personnel to attend at least one of the 'Flagship Events' (listed on the NVN website) each year. But, of course, attendance at more of the many other events listed in the NVN Calendar is also strongly encouraged.
- Encourage smaller and/or declining Associations to consider amalgamating or affiliating with other 'related' Associations (eg. create a combined Destroyers Association) as a means to consolidate scarce resources and members, and to reduce duplication of such things as Newsletters.
- Support the NAA's efforts to develop a strategy to become the 'champion' or 'advocate' for all ex-Navy Associations' needs and concerns in Victoria, including consideration of a consolidated or more coordinated communication link, event coordination and funding processes, veterans support advocacy

I remember him on cold winter mornings after a snow fall. He was the first person in the street with a shovel in his hand and would start clearing the snow from the footpaths of people's homes, usually for a couple of widows and old people who lived close by. He participated in very hard physical acts, even though he seemed much older than some of the elderly people he was actually helping.

Jack was still hanging around the area during my teenage years but it was a period of my life when I had little respect for elders and neither was I interested in their stories of the past. Stories of the Second World War or when a pint of beer cost just six pence and the basic salary was three pounds a week, or descriptions of their ailments such as back pain or gout etc., simply bored me to tears. My friends and I used to think that old farts who lived in the past and had never really lived at all. My priorities at that time were drinking beer in the pubs, hanging out with my mates, chasing girls, supporting my football team and listening to rock music etc. Nothing else seemed important.

It was some years later and a short time after I had joined the Merchant Navy that I met Jack again. He stopped me in the street one day and mentioned that my Dad had told him that I was at sea working as an engineer. He asked me if I could arrange to get him a Nautical Chart showing the east coast of northern Brazil and French Guiana and he would provide me with a couple of coordinates which he wanted marked on the chart (which he sent to me a couple of days later). I had no idea why he wanted it but after I joined my next ship I arranged a chart to be prepared, had the Chief Mate insert the coordinates and forwarded it back to Jack via my father and thought no more about it.

Jack thanked me a lot the next time I saw him some months later, mentioning that it was the coordinates of where he had been attacked by a U-Boat when he was with the D.E.M.S. during the Second World War aboard a ship called the M.V. Tower Grange.

It was during my next trip to sea when I learned about the Tower Grange. I was having a drink in the crew's bar after my watch one evening, when a couple of elderly oilers were discussing ships they had sailed on during the war and the close encounters they had experienced with enemy ships and planes. I mentioned to them about my neighbour Jack and that he was on the Tower Grange during that time. One of them, an Irishman, thought for a few seconds and announced: "Wait a minute! I know about the Tower Grange. She was torpedoed and sunk by a German U-Boat. Some crew members were lost and the others made it to the

## Battle of Savo Island

The Battle of Savo Island is a major WWII battle where HMAS Canberra I was lost. It was 9AUG42 with the Imperial Japanese Navy bearing down on the Allied Forces. The IJN had a bearing on the destroyer USS Blue. USS Blue had not sighted the IJN Task Force, all of the IJN guns were aimed at the *Blue*. The IJN Task Force slipped past the Blue, proceeding past Savo Island. Shortly after passing the Island, the IJN came into contact with the Allied Force Screening Force. Canberra was the lead ship. It was early morning when the Japanese were sighted. At the same time Japanese aircraft, launched some two hours earlier were in the area and dropped flares. The flares silhouetted Canberra and Chicago. The IJN opened fire on the task force, *Canberra* being the lead ship took the full force of the Japanese attack and was quickly disabled. USS Chicago was severely damaged, although it managed to stay operational. The IJN had diminished the capacity of this Screening Force to where it was virtually ineffective. The Japanese continued their sweep around Savo Island, deploying into two columns and approached the Northern most Screening Force at high speed. Again complete surprise was achieved with just as devastating results. The Japanese ships opened fire on the Allied Task Force at very close range and in a short

space of time the US Ships *Quincy* and *Vincennes* were sunk with Astoria being badly damaged. During this action the Japanese flagship Chokai received hits knocking out the command structure. Being unaware as to the location and strength of the remaining Allied forces the Japanese did not appreciate their advantage and withdrew. Notwithstanding, on their way passed the outer screening destroyers the Japanese engaged and damaged the US Ralph Talbot. Soon after, the full extend of the action was evidenct. The Japanese had sunk the cruisers *Quincy* and *Vin*cennes. The cruisers Canberra and Astoria, and destroyers *Ralph Talbot* and *Patterson* were serverely damaged. Given the extent of damage to *Canberra*, The Task Force Commander, Admiral Turner ordered Canberra to be abandoned if she could not get underway. Canberra could not raise steam, all survivors were evacuated and USS Selfridge fired 263 x 5 inch shells, plus four torpedoes into *Canberra*. *Canberra* defied all attempts, until USS Ellet fired a torpedo that finally saw Canberra sink. At the conclusion of this action, the only warships on station were cruisers HMA Ships Australia and Hobart and USS San Juan with their destroyers escorts. The landing on Guadalcanal continued, despite the depleted Naval cover. This established the essential air strip and base from which the allied forces were to forge a trail north to Japan. 1,000 sailors made the supreme sacrifice and 700 were injured. (Canberra 84 killed, 109 injured)

## Nerves & Steel

A fantastic exhibition, Nerves and Steel is now open for display at the Shrine of Remembrance Melbourne. The exhibition was launched with a very special presentation by RADM Guy Griffiths AO DSO DSC RAN Rtd. The Admiral gave an expose of his early career as a young Naval Officer during WWII. A milestone appointment was his posting to HMS Repulse, he was in Repulse when that fine warship was sunk by the Imperial Japanese Navy. The Admiral described the experience of departing the sinking ship, swimming to a destroyer nearby and waiting in the water for his turn to be assisted into the ship. A stark distinction between the best training available and the real thing. He went on to describe vital features of his wartime commitment, including the island hoping going north towards Tokyo. In the audience was his class mate, David Manning - a survivor of the sinking of HMAS *Perth*, followed by years as a Prisoner of War. There were several WWII Veterans present, making this occasion particularly notable.



CMDR Luke Ryan RAN, Commanding Officer, RAN Recruit School also presented. CMDR Ryan spoke eloquently about the current stream of recruits entering the Navy and their capacity to maintain the legacy of service and sacrifice created by so many, including those Veterans attending the launch of the Nerves and Steel exhibition. Plan a visit to the exhibition, you have a year to do so, remember it ends 29JUL18.

### Nulka

There are some unique contraptions being designed to defend our warships, such as the Nulka Active Missile Decoy.  $\rightarrow$ HMAS Darwin (pictured) firing a missile whilst in the Eastern Australian Exercise Area. A device that simulates the parent warship, providing a signature of a virtual image at a safe distance from the actual ship. This acts as a digital decoy for any incoming weapon relying upon an electronic signature.



A vast difference to the 40/60 bofor many of the old salts remember. As the discussion on relevance prevails, with respect to surface ships and submarines described in the Defence White Paper, the advent of these new techniques and systems begin to shape the Navy of the future. It wasn't long ago that desk top computers were apprehensively introduced, now they are a normal part of a sophisticated network supporting operational as well as training regimes. Nulka may be the start of the next generation.



Arunta

HMAS Arunta has been welcomed home after completing the longest Middle East deployment by a Royal Australian Navy vessel since 1990. The frigate, home to a ship's company of 191 docked at Fleet Base West on 23JUL17. A nine-month deployment conducting counter-terrorism & maritime security operations. The crew intercepted 800kg of hashish and more than 500kg of heroin. CO, CMDR Cameron Steil said "The illegal narcotics had street value of more than \$186 million, according to Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission figures. "We covered a lot of ocean and we are pleased to be home," CMDR Steil said. "Since

departing in November last year, we have travelled more than 49,000 nautical miles, equivalent to 2.5 times around the world." *Conquer of Die*!

## Naval Association

How many of us have given any serious thought to what the Naval Association of Australia is about. A national organisation that is not well known to most in the Navy fraternity, a tad surprising for those that have been around for a long time. Most will argue that many organisations are in decline, ex-service groups are no different, but have we asked why? If we take Australian Defence Force numbers, let's stick with Navy: 14,000 Permanent and maybe 2,000 Reservists, retention levels appear to indicate a nine year term. Taking these numbers, we may well have 1,700 potential new members each year to encourage, or is that convince to take up the challenge. You may have seen that the NAA has taken a new approach to their service delivery, naming four pillars: Care, Commemoration, Cadets and Camaraderie. There is the thought that everyone in a Ship Association is in the NAA. The tivities is one thing, repudiating commemoration is membership of NCCV is made up of Ship Associations, it is obvious that they are not all in the NAA. It would be worthwhile looking at common ground between ex-Navy organisations. The segregation

that pervades virtually everything that identies us as ex-Navy may need to be de-constructed, reviewed with an honest approach to sustainability. As noted at page 1, a workshop arranged by Melbourne Naval Committee and NCCV a few months ago came to the conclusion that the NAA is the only national network capable of delivering a sustainable future of the ex-Navy fraternity. How we respond to the challenge is under review, some folk have a desire, an appetite to initiate change. However, there are many strong, well intentioned individuals in the game that are able to make a positive impact. One area where commonality should be easy to master, is commemoration. If individuals don't want to be part of remembering the legacy of service and sacrifice of the tens of thousands that went before us, then so be it. Not supporting commemoration acanother. Our collective desire should be to ensure past service is never forgotten. A natural extension of this position is to understand inherited Battle Honours, the connection between past and present.

### President's Dit

Naval Lore. The 'old salts' may know, but for us ODs to pass the trivia night we need to know how Port & Starbourd came about! A single steering oar or sweep was fixed onto the righthand side of the vessel, it became know as *steer board* side. This became universal, but it was difficult to put the vessel alongside whilst using the steering oar, so naturally the vessel would berth steer board outboard. They would then put a plank from the vessel to the jetty. This plank or board was called the loadboard. There was doubtless confusion over the use of the terms *larboard* and *starboard*. Then along came ships with much higher freeboard, so they cut a loading door in the ship's side. These were called ports, steer board became star*board* and the docking side became known as the portside. Imagine, you could have gone your entire life not knowing that important naval lore. The Lanyard- original use of the (uniform) lanyard was to secure the pussers dirk. The lanyard was long enough so that when aloft it could be opened whilst holding onto the rigging. It was worn under the collar for comfort, appearance, and to prevent choking if the lanyard was caught below the turk's head. Still adorns the ceremonial rig!
