For several years CDRE Bob Trotter OAM RAN Rtd has been involved with the WA Museum/Curtin University project to rephotograph HMAS Sydney and HSK Kormran in HD 3D Video. The project has been underway through May 2015at the site of the two hulks. The Project Team has been working closely with a number of partners: these include Australian National Maritime Museum, the Australian War Memorial and University of Western Australia. The purpose of the project is to secure new information using high definition. three-dimensional imaging technology to record in detail the wrecks of Sydney (II) and Kormran. The imagery obtained will allow assessment of the deterioration of the vessels; create a 'point-in-time' digital record of their state of preservation; provide important evidence to elucidate the nature of their When the wrecks were found in 2008 encounter; create a unique resource to provide interpretive and educational material in a number of high profile museum venues and be available online. Bob reports that it is an exciting start as early ROV dives on Sydney and Kormoran have produced new photographic evidence. The vision thus far appears to confirm why Sydney was so quickly disabled, through catastrophic damage and the devastating loss of everyone on board. The first high resolution images taken by Curtin University on board DOF Subsea's vessel Skandi *Protector* clearly show, for the first time, a 15cm shell-hole through the bridge at the compass platform. is a remarkable early discovery for the expedition as it provides support for the German captain Theodor Detmers' account that within the first 30 seconds of

the battle, Sydney's bridge was destroyed, her command structure lost, and her ability to effectively fight back severely disabled. It would appear we now have photographic evidence to support that, thanks to Curtin University's technology. Photographed below is the damaged turret on the Sydney.



the shell-hole was not obvious, presenting as a shadow in the photographs taken at the time. The new imaging technology, developed by Curtin University is throwing new light on the circumstances associated with both historic sites. The photograph below shows a gun placement on Kormoran.

HMAS Cerberus

In Greek mythology *Cerberus* was a ferocious dog guarding the entrance to Hades. Said to be a hideous creature, as was the new Monitor warships, hence the name Cerberus. HMAS Cerberus [the Monitor] was taken over by the Victoria Government as a guardian for Port Phillip Bay. Cerberus presented a rather ungainly appearance and was described in one newspaper as an 'elongated gasometer'. She spent more than 30 years at her moorings off Williamstown as a floating fortress. She was said to have kept Port Phillip Bay virtually impregnable. But those were years free from direct threat to Australia and when defence once again became a matter for concern she was obsolete. When the Commonwealth Naval Forces became the RAN in 1912 the Naval Depot at Williamstown was commissioned HMAS Cerberus. In 1921 the Williamstown training establishment was transferred to Flinders Naval Depot. At the same time as the monitor *Cerberus* was removed from the Navy List. The monitor remained off Williamstown for a few years before being sold, firstly to a private firm and then to the Municipal authorities of Black Rock. The Council filled Cerberus with concreate and sank the hulk as a breakwater where she can be seen today. A most inglorious ending for a ship which had guarded Victoria for so long.

HMAS Creswell



A century has passed since HMAS Creswell was established. The first Cadets, pictured left, initiated what has become a highly regarded

institution. After a short period at Osborne House, Geelong, Cadets were relocated to the new establishment at Jervis Bay in 1915. Creswell has been the home for most of Navy's Officers over the past 100 years. Australian Defence force Academy will eventually overtake Creswell as the primary starting place, but nothing will diminish

The Expert Panel

Serious decision making is underway with respect to the selection of Australia's next generation of Submarines. On the 5th June the Minister of Defence, the Honourable Kevin Andrews MP announced that France, Germany and Japan were confirmed as potential partners in the design and build of Australia's future submarine programme. He announced the establishment of an Expert Advisory Panel, that will oversee the competitive evaluation process. The Expert Advisory Panel will ensure that the competitive evaluation process remains sound, is conducted in accordance with acceptable probity and accountability principles, and that participants have been treated fairly and equitably. The expert panel will comprise the following professions: 1 Professor Donald Winter, a former US Navy Secretary; 2 The Honourable Julie Anne Dods-Streeton, a former Justice - Federal Court of Australia; 3 Mr Ron Finlay, one of Australia's leading infrastructure specialists with extensive legal experience; and 4 Mr Jim McDowell, a member of the First Principles Review Team with extensive Defence experience. The Minister Advised that significant work will be undertaken in South Australia. It is anticipated that work in SA will include integration of combat systems, design assurance & testing of land based systems.

HMAS Waterhen

On the 30 June 1941, HMAS Waterhen listing to port prior to being taken in tow, later sank at Tobruk. Waterhen left Alexandria, Egypt, laden with troops for Tobruk on 28 June 1941. During the evening of 29 June 1941 both Waterhen and HMS Defender, her 10th Flotilla companion, were attacked by German dive-bombers. Waterhen was crippled and holed but fortunately without casualties. Defender avoided damage and was able to go alongside Waterhen and take off the troops and ship's company. attempts to save 'the old chook' as she was known, Waterhen rolled over and sank on 30 June 1941. She was the first RAN ship lost from enemy action in World War II, but the fourth ship lost from the 10th Destroyer Flotilla. The 10th Destroyer Flotilla was led by Captain Hec Waller RAN, Commanding Officer HMAS Stuart. HMS Defender survived Waterhen by only a few days. On 11 July Defender was attacked again, bombed and sunk during her return run to Alexandria in company with HMAS Vendetta. Waterhen was the only destroyer of the Scrap Iron Flotilla to be lost in the Mediterranean despite the intense work load under particularly hazardous conditions. Vampire was also sunk, after departing the Mediterranean and commencing escort duties alongside the RN in the Indian Ocean.

ANZAC Centenary

Navy's involvement in WWI continued during 1915, however, there were no significant events established as milestones. The Army on the other hand was engaged in major confrontations in Europe resulting in dramatic losses. For instance, the Battle of Lone Pine in August 1915 where the main Turkish trench taken by Australians in 20 minutes, followed by several days fighting resulting in 2,000 ANZAC casualties. Commonly known as the August offensive, involved Lone Pine and the Nek. This offensive committed the 8th Light Horse, 10th and the 9th attacked, Quinn's Post 1st Light Horse Brigade, plus the massive "swing" around the left flank. This was 4th Bde, with New Zealanders plus British and Indian units. The 8th Light House was almost wiped out. Notwithstanding, it will be 101 years since the Battle of Bita Paka. Navy needs to be appropriately represented at this pilgrimage to demonstrate our respect and admiration for the effort made by the Australian Military Expeditionary Force as they claimed Rabaul Communication Station.
