FIRST IN - LAST OUT

As the focus is very much on the Gallipoli campaign this year we thought it would be relevant to highlight the deeds of one particular Naval unit active during the campaign –

The 1st Royal Australian Bridging Train.

On 12 February 1915, the Government made an offer to the Imperial Government to provide one Bridging Train, in accordance with *Imperial War Establishments*. Within a week, the offer was accepted. Command of the Train was given to Lieutenant Commander Bracegirdle.

The 1st RANBT was formed in Melbourne on 28 February 1915 and was intended to be a horse drawn engineering unit attached to the Royal Naval Division, then serving as infantry on the Western Front.

Three hundred naval reservists, including 50 men who had recently served in New Guinea, were selected for the 1st RANBT and they began their training in horsemanship, engineering and pontoon bridging at the Domain in Melbourne.

On 4 June 1915 the 1st RANBT sailed from Melbourne in HMAT Port Macquarie bound for active service with 5 Officers, 3 Warrant Officers, 267 Petty Officers and other ranks, 26 reinforcements, 412 horses, 5 6-horse pontoons and trestle wagons, and 8 other vehicles.

Arriving at the Greek isle of Imbros, the Train received a total of

five days of instruction on the use of their pontoons, a task which needed six days worth of unloading and reloading the equipment. After this training, they were judged ready to land under fire.

On the morning of 7 August 1915 the 1st RANBT landed under fire at Suvla Bay from the transport Itria. Its first task was constructing two piers and rowing the second into place at A Beach, a trip of approximately 2 miles, for use by the lifeboats evacuating injured soldiers. The Train assembled the 110 metre long structure in 20 minutes.

The Train set up its camp at what became known as Kangaroo Beach. It was responsible for a wide variety of tasks including: building and maintaining wharves and piers, unloading stores from lighters, controlling the supply of fresh water to front line troops, stock-piling engineering equipment, building a light railway for stores movements and carrying out repairs in an open-air workshop. These activities took place under frequent enemy artillery fire and occasional air raids

According to the Train's log, 30 September was a special day. It was the second day in a row that the base had not been shelled by Turkish artillery. Of course, they would make up for the oversight on 1 October, but for the sailors it was a welcome reprieve. While the Train wasn't itself involved in actual fighting, it was constantly shelled and bombed by Turkish forces.

The AIF Official War Correspondent, Charles Bean came to Suvla Bay specifically to report on the Train, where he found that:

"There they are today, in charge of the landing of a great part of the stores of a British army. They are quite cut off from their own force; they scarcely come into the category of the Australian Force, and scarcely into that of the British; they are scarcely army and scarcely navy. Who it is that looks after their special interests, and which is the authority that has the power of recognising any good work that they have done, I do not know. If you want to see the work, you have only to go to Kangaroo Beach, Suvla Bay, and look about you. They have made a harbour."

In November 1915, Field Marshal Lord Kitchener instructed Lt General Birdwood, to begin planning to evacuate the Peninsula. Winter was coming and already too many soldiers were being taken sick and even dying of hypothermia and frostbite, while

the Turks had been stubbornly holding their ground.

Once the official decision was made by the War Cabinet, preparations were made, carefully disguised to make it seem as though units that could be withdrawn to Mudros safely would be, leaving enough troops to defend the ground taken for the winter, while the bulk of the troops would return in spring for a new offensive. Troops and equipment started slipping away from the front and aboard Navy vessels from 8 December 1915.

During that time, the Train's log shows work parties completing construction of roads and buildings on the same day as other parties were disassembling other buildings and stocking supplies for transport, with shifts working around the clock.

The Train was the last Australian unit to leave the Gallipoli Peninsula, a party of 50 men under Sub-Lieutenant Charles Hicks was left behind to oversee the evacuation of the British forces. They left at 4.30am on 20 December 2015, 20 minutes after the last troops left Anzac Cove.



Eight of the 1st RANBT's number died while serving overseas on active service.

1st RAN Bridging Train Memorial Tree Plaque

The Train was Australia's most decorated Naval unit of the First World War, with more than 20 decorations awarded to its sailors.

Every Capital City marked MGEN Jim Hughes AO, Veteran of 4 the occasion with a parade of service and ex-service men and women. In Melbourne the turnout brought together impressive parade, led by Navy with over fourteen hundred men and women, wearing service medals with pride. The addresses included; the Governor of Victoria speaking of the hard work contributed by over 34,000 individuals over a long period of time. The Hon Kevin Andrews MP, Minister for Defence representing the PM was present and delivered an address, siting the importance of the work undertaken by Australians through Operation Slipper. The Hon Daniel Andrews MP, Premier of Victoria also delivered an address. focused on the hardship of Operation Slipper and in particular the sentiment of lost life and the danger faced and dealt with whilst in the Middle East. All of the addresses touched on the loss suffered by Victorian families present. who lost a family member during Operation Slipper. White Ensign

The first White Ensign had been flown by the RN since 1801 and by the RAN from 1901 through to 1MAR67. There must be about 14,000 sailors out there who served under both White Ensigns. Wednesday, 1MAR67 → witnessed the exchange of AWEs. This change was initiated by Australia's in-



volvement in Vietnam. HMAS *Boonaroo* was the ship commissioned under the new AWE, that was



also on 1MAR67, required due to industrial unrest where the MUA would not support the Defence Force serving in Vietnam. The *Boonaroo* was leased for only one voyage to Vietnam, returning to the Australian National Shipping Line on completion. HMAS GERANIUM

Marty Grogan OAM, V/ Pres NCCV sourced what appears to be the original ship's bell off HMAS *Ge*ranium. The bell was donated to the *Cerberus* Museum Manager by Ms Susan Tanck, Honorary Historian - Scouts Australia. Marty's keen eye for key



Navy artifacts has enabled this bell to be seen by all. Elaborately mounted for display it has been hidden from view since the ship was decommissioned. *Geranium*, one of 56 Arabis-class sloops built for the Royal Navy, was built in Scotland and launched in 1915. The ship was operated by the Royal Navy as a minesweeper from 1915 to 1919. These Sloops of War were intended for minesweeping duties in European waters. At the end of WWI, she was transferred to the Royal Australian Navy for use as a survey ship between 1919 and 1927. *Geranium* paid off in 1927. Later in 1932, the ship was broken up at Cockatoo Island and the stripped hulk was towed beyond the Heads and sunk on 24 April 1935.

Sea Power Centre

The newsletter Semaphore, Issue 01 2015 published by the Sea Power Centre, details a terrific story by John Perryman. The article touches on the RAN Bridging Team that trained up in the Domain, Melbourne before being deployed to Gallipoli. The importance of this team stems from their direct involvement at Gallipoli in arranging and managing beach assets. These assets comprised make shift jetties and pontoons that were used for the transfer of supplies and reinforcements, made possible after the area had been secured. The article refers to how the RN used sailors in this way, no doubt because of their rope handing capability, maybe that is 'rigging' in today's parlance It may be of interest to know that the first Bridge Team in Victoria was in the 1850s, with the Army Engineers and was based where Alexandra Gardens are today. They moved from the Gardens to Swan Street, where the Burnley Tunnel exhaust station is located. There are plaques at each of these locations to identify the fact that Army Engineers were at work in those places. Navy got involved very early in the 1900s, however, the term and the role changed soon after WWI. Perryman also mentions the RAN Beach Commandos. This group comprised 1,000 Aussie sailors & 20,000 USN sailors trained at HMAS Assault, Nelson Bar.

ANZAC Centenary

ANZAC Day will be a key activity this year and is likely to attract many Melburnians to the Dawn Service, Shrine of Remembrance and also to the march from the CBD. WWI Descendants are encouraged to watch the march and if wearing the medals of your forebears then join in the march from Swanston Street, at a little after 1100.
