The Federal government's recent decision and announcement concerning Shipbuilding in Australia will be welcomed by all who take an interest in maritime matters. It lays down a roadmap for the expansion of an industry of enormous importance to the future of our nation. Over the past century the foundation stones have been laid: the decisions now taken provide a plan which hopefully will be strongly supported by politicians of all persuasion.

In 1911, less than 10 years after Federation, when visionary Prime Ministers Fisher and Deakin were being urged by the First Naval Member, Rear Admiral Creswell, to hasten the establishment of the Royal Australian Navy as an autonomous service independent of control and direction from the British Admiralty, a retired Royal Navy Admiral, Sir Reginald Henderson, was appointed to advise on infrastructure development for the RAN. In a comprehensive and ambitious report the Henderson plan examined the suitability of ports in all states and recommended a profusion of bases and sub bases around the coast with at least two in each state. Interestingly, while Port Jackson and Port Phillip were to be the commercial ports for Sydney and Melbourne, Jervis Bay was to be the same for the ACT (with a railway across the Clyde Mountain connecting the port to Canberra), Westernport was to be the major east coast Naval port

coast and Cockburn Sound (now HMAS STIRLING) the western one. The plan was never fully implemented but it identified the potential of our coastline and highlighted how important shipping would be to the development and defence of the fledgling country.

We have many fine ports around our coast and several of them already have well-developed, state-of- the-art shipbuilding facilities. We have highly skilled, experienced professionals in the shipbuilding industry, an abundance of natural resources, men and women with the knowledge brains and vision to enable Australia to become a southern hemisphere leader in this capacity – and now (at last!) the prospect of Federal funding to realise our potential.

It is timely that a decision of this magnitude be made just as a long-time motor car manufacturing industry is being brought to a close. Though the application may be different, the skills and crafts required in both shipbuilding and car manufacture have much in common.

Technology may provide faster, more cost effective means of transport and communication between nations and facilitate the construction of bigger, more efficient ships but nothing will ever replace the sea as the highway for world trade. Australia can play a major role in developing and building future generations of ships not only for ourselves but for our region and the world beyond. Let us hope our political masters hold true to their projections.

The Turning Point

For many decades the Battle of the Coral Sea has been seen as the turning point, the time when the superiority of the Japanese Imperial Navy was denied success. Up until this point, they had moved hostilely through the Pacific, demonstrating their air superiority at every military engagement, including Pearl Harbour. It has been said that their Naval prowess was of a very high order, however, the engagement in the Coral Sea showed that their competency was wanting. The use of air power was new to the senior officers, their more junior pilot officers had relevant warlike experience. Their pilots had experienced success through air warfare. Their mission was to take control of Moresby. New Guinea, a task the Japanese were unable to execute. One of their pilots, LCDR Shigehazu Shimazaki, said 'never in all my years in combat have I even imagined a battle like that (Coral Sea). When we attacked the enemy carriers and their supporting ships blackened the sky with exploding shells and tracers. It seemed impossible that we could survive our bombing and torpedo runs through such incredible defences'. As the Allied Forces fortunately reduced the number of Japanese aircraft, primarily through superior numbers of USA aircraft. To mark the 74th anniversary of the Battle of the Coral Sea, a commemorative service was held at the Shrine of Remembrance. The service was arranged by the Australia/America Association, the Ex-American Servicemen Association and the NCCV. The service was attended by several parliamentarians, representing federal and state governments. Also present was a

US Consul General representative, along with a number of Veterans, including Norm Tame who was in HMAS Australia at the time of the Battle of the Coral Sea. Officiating, Chaplain Paul Stuart JP RAN (below).

Having the capability of tasking this level of significant air power conveys a level of supremacy few countries could wish for. Thankfully the Alliance between Australia and the USA has at its core our mutual support. The ANZUS Alliance was agreed in SEP51, although New Zealand was suspended from the Alliance in 1986 when they banned US Warships from entering New Zealand ports due to their political position on nuclear power ships & nuclear weapons.

Naval Lore - Paying Off. Until 1825 a portion of a sailor's pay was held back as a guarantee against desertion. It was the practice to pay off the men at the end of a commission, hence the expression, a ship paying off. The only permanent members of the Ship's company were the Captain, his lieutenants and warrant officers.

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
