Editorial

Whilst the principal objective of Navy Victoria Network is to consolidate news of interest to the Navy family, there is also a role to engender interest in relating matters, such as our maritime artefacts. Closely related to this role is the Shrine of Remembrance and the Galleries of Remembrance project, which is the Victorian State Government's primary contribution to the Centennial of ANZAC arrangements. Centennial of ANZAC commences in 2014 and concludes 2018, although there maybe activities scheduled into 2019 as closure events heralded the end of repatriation.

A constant underpinning each idea conveyed through NVN is the need to engender interest from the wider Navy family. At the moment we rely upon a small group of champions to stimulate others with an interest. A small commitment from everyone is all that is required to enable the Maritime/Naval heritage to be sustained. on the website < www.anzaccentenary.vic.gov.au that 17 troop ships departed Melbourne for Albany in September/October 1914. The website provides an opportunity for those that are related to the troops who departed in those ships to register. This may enable you to be included in future arrangements relating to the centennial of the original departure.

From Dogtown (Williamstown) the Melbourne skyline appears to be dominated by the Warship NUSHIP CANBERRA, Landing Helicopter Dock (LHD). The opportunity to tour the ship at this phase of construction is not allowed, the focus being to complete the build on time and at the agreed cost. Viewing the CANBERRA from HMAS CASTLEMAINE Museum Ship at Gem Pier Williamstown and other maritime assets in the area might cause you to think about the wide range of maritime artefacts that do exist. We have a wealth of memorabilia spread across the entire country. It might be time to produce an 'Ap' that enables an efficient tour of these assets along with a narrative and vision of each key asset. Who is willing to stand up and take on such an exercise?

The Rogues Yarn below also delivers information relating to some important events that have recently occurred, such as the flagship HMAS GOORANGAI Commemorative Service. The tragedy that surrounds the loss of GOORANGAI highlights the dangers of life at sea. We should also be prepared to demonstrate our appreciation of the fact that the Ship's Company were just doing their job, an important job targeted at keeping our coast line clear of danger by removing 100 mines from Bass Strait. The assembly at Queenscliff attracted some 150 Veterans, ex-Navy men and women. Captain Kath Richards RAN, Commanding Officer HMAS CERBERUS and Senior Naval Officer Victoria delivered a stirring address that epitomised the plight of Australians as they discovered the loss of our first Warship in 1940, during WWII.

The first surface warship lost by the Royal Australian Navy was HMAS GOORANGAI. The entire crew of 24 hands were lost in a matter of minutes on 20th November 1940.



† HMAS GOORANGAI was a fishing trawler converted at the start of WW1I for the purpose of minesweeping. A job ideally suited to this small vessel of some 223 tons. Built in 1919 in Sydney, it was one of eight vessels owned and operated by the fishing company Cam & Sons Pty Ltd, all of which were requisitioned by the RAN as auxiliary minesweepers. These small vessels proved to be good at their job, demonstrated by their ability to make safe Bass Strait by clearing many of the 100 mines laid by the Japanese. It was after completing the arduous task of clearing mines that the GOORANGAI required more stores and headed to Oueenscliff. Initially GOORANGAI was Anchored off Queenscliff, by all reports the weather was such that a better location was deemed necessary. GOORANGAI weighed anchor and proceeded to Port Phillip Bay. It was during this simple manoeuvre that the tragic loss of the vessel with all hands occurred. Only six bodies of the 24 man crew were recovered. One could not be identified and that leads us to another aspect

of this tragedy and that is that the remains of the unidentified crew member of GOORANGAI is at rest in an unmarked grave at Williamstown. This discovery was made by POMT Andrew Campbell after an exhaustive study of the circumstances surrounding the tragic loss of GOORANGAI. The Office of Australian War Graves has been contacted by Andrew and he is processing the relevant information required. With Andrew's dedication to this task, hopefully this error will be corrected in the not too distant future. This is a remarkable find by Andrew and he is to be congratulated for his

concerted effort.

On Sunday, 17NOV13 over 150 ex-Navy men and women, families and descendants assembled to commemorate the loss of this small fishing trawler deployed to remove mines from our shoreline. Those assembled were fortunate to be welcomed by Cr Helene Cameron, Mayor, Borough of Queenscliffe and hear a moving address by Captain Kath Richards, CO HMAS CERBERUS. Chaplain Simon Cooper RANR was the officiating Chaplain and was instrumental in making the service a memorable one. We were also pleased to have Mr Simon Ramsay MP, representative the Minister attend and assist to lay a wreath. Simon accompanied Captain Richards and Mr Wal Ladlow who placed the wreath at the HMAS GOORANGAI memorial cairn. Wal is the brother of AB Arthur Ladlow, RANR aged 20 at the time of his untimely death. A wreath was placed on the existing ship wreck under eight metres of water in the Bay by divers from Diving Victoria on the actual anniversary of the loss.



ANZAC Centenary

The ANZAC Centennial Committee has expressed some interest in finding the first shell fired at the outset of WWI. This occurred in Port Phillip Bay, fired from Point Nepean on the 4th August 1914. Watch this space for more information as no doubt there will be some positive action taken to discover if the shell remains on the bay floor. On a slightly more realistic level is the proposal to arrange a commemorative service in recognition of the Battle of Bita Paka, 11 September 2014. In past years this has been primarily organised by the Northcote RSL, however, it now time for Navy to get involved. This is particularly relevant given the first casualty of WWI, Able Seaman Billy Williams, a sailor from Melbourne was shot as the Australian Naval and Military Expeditionary Force conducted an offensive to capture the German Radio Station at Bita Paka, near Rabaul. Soon after was the tragic loss of HMAS AE1 as it scouted around for enemy warships off New Guinea. These WWI events demand our attention as we remind ourselves of their sacrifice.
