This is a very important occasion and a social activity afterwards that brings old and young together in a manner we can all enjoy.

Offloading of LHD01 [CANBERRA]



Blue Marlin is presently anchored about 2 miles off Port Arlington and they intend to off load Canberra not far from there, but more in the middle of the bay in 23 meters of water which will leave about 1.5 meters below Blue Marlin's hull during the off loading. The operation of submerging the Blue Marlin and off load will take about 8-12 hours, weather dependant. This should happen this Friday 26th or Saturday 27th all being well. The Canberra will then be towed to Williamstown and will pass Frankston in the normal shipping channel. If we hear any more we will advise.
